Editor's Comment

ALMOST five years after it closed its doors the historic Raven Inn at Culcheth is at last set to re-open after a lot of blood, sweat and tears.

Those involved have worked tirelessly to breathe new life into the old building which had been left in a near dilapidated condition after being earmarked for a housing development.

I am sure the new look Raven will be a credit to the community, and it is important that the community truly value what has been achieved.

Congratulations to all those involved in making a dream become a reality. It shows what can be achieved with determination.

Meanwhile down the road at Risley it has not been such good news, far from it.

The damning report on Risley Prison makes shocking reading which you can see more of elsewhere in this edition. Its hard to believe things have been left to get so bad, parts of the prison are no longer fit for purpose.

I know many people will think those jailed for crimes deserve the punishment they get but we still need a prison fit for purpose, especially when it comes to trying to rehabilitate offenders. It will be interesting to see what steps are taken to resolve the problem.

A little further down the road there was more bad news for local residents with the approval of the development of the Trident Business Park which will include the

demolition of the former Noggin pub.

Local residents have been left outraged and the Risley Residents Community Group have thoroughly explored their position regarding this application and I am told have taken the relevant advice onboard.

It appears that post determination, they cannot challenge the decision. But after getting the webcast of the DMC meeting transcribed and upon additional advice, the view is they have more than sufficient evidence to challenge both the technical completeness of the application, the assessment of the application by the WBC Planning Officers and the accuracy of the information provided to the committee members



by the planning officer at the DMC meeting.

I know this application decision has caused some heated exchanges politically and it will be interesting to see the outcome of the official complaint.

As of going to press the borough council confirmed to me that the official complaint had been received and would be responded to.

Conversion plan for Green Belt barn

A PLAN to convert a 19th century barn into a dwelling on Green Belt land at Croft has been submitted to Warrington's planning department.

Oven Back Cottage, in Winwick Lane, Croft is thought to date from the early to mid-1800s and adjoins the barn, currently used for storage only.

Early tythe maps appear to show the barn was larger when it was built than it is today.

But the proposals involve only minor changes in the appearance of the building.


The plans seek to create a three-bedroom dwelling, making use of existing features where possible. Most of the existing fabric would be retained. Existing traditional apertures showing the building's historic use would be infilled with glass, including a hay cart opening.

A porch would be added, but this would add interest to a plan elevation. Historic stairs would be retained. The west wall would be clad with timber because removal of existing cement rendering would only reveal bricks in a poor condition.

All proposed landscaping would be of a simple design, in keeping with the surroundings.

Only minor alterations are proposed to the external appearance of the barn and the proposal would result in sustainable re-use of a redundant building.

Planning officers will now consider the proposals.



Improvements made to animal rescue centre

IMPROVEMENTS have been made to weather-proof an animal rescue centre thanks to a community fund set up by housebuilder Redrow.

Little Nest Rescue successfully applied for a £500 grant from the company to lay new stone paths at the centre to allow the community to visit during the winter months. The fund was launched to help community groups, charities and other good causes based in, or serving, the area around Redrow's new development Oakwood Fields, in Lowton, near Warrington.

Katy Pinder, director of Little Nest Rescue, said: "We are trying to create a safe area for our volunteers and the community to be able to access the rescue and enjoy the therapy our animals offer. We haven't been able to open our doors to the community during the winter months due to mud preventing access to our fields and woodland. But thanks to Redrow's community fund we will be able to do that this year."

Unannounced inspection reveals astonishing failures by the prison service with parts of HMP Risley beyond repair!

AN unannounced inspection of HMP Risley by the Chief Inspector of Prisons has revealed an "astonishing failure by the prison service" with unstable leadership and some parts of the prison now beyond repair!

With 1,032 prisoners at the time of the inspection last April, the mixed sex offender and general category C resettlement prison had a myriad of problems, including inadequate public protection arrangements, higher than average violence among the general population, high levels of self-harm, and very poor time out of cell and access to education or employment.

Living conditions at Risley prison had deteriorated since the last inspection and the proportion of men serving sentences for sexual offences had increased significantly representing 40% of the population. However, there were still no accredited programmes for these prisoners, which was described as an "astonishing failure by the prison service".

A report by Charlie Taylor HM Chief Inspector of Prisons, said: "For the last two years, the leadership had been unstable, with temporary governors being in post for most of that time. The current acting governor had worked hard to maintain stability and set an

agenda that sought to improve decency in the jail and support his staff team, but the prison was still not fulfilling its function as a category C resettlement prison.

The many prisoners who were unemployed were locked up for 22 hours a day, in a prison that had not created enough places in work or education for the size of the population. The jail operated a split regime which meant that most prisoners were only in poorly paid, part-time work or education. They did not have enough time out of their cells, with no evening association and an even worse situation at the weekend. Only those on the excellent, enhanced living unit had a regime that was commensurate with the category of the prison.

"Inspectors were particularly concerned about the public protection arrangements at Risley. The offender management unit was understaffed and there was insufficient support from probation services; this meant that some of the public protection arrangements were inadequate, men were not

supported to reduce their risk of harm, and preparations for release were often not good enough. Some high-risk prisoners were released homeless, systems to monitor phone calls and other contact were not managed effectively, and some were leaving having had little or no interaction with a prison offender manager.

"Since the last inspection the proportion of men serving sentences for sexual offences had increased significantly, and they now represented 40% of the total population, but there was a failure to provide for them. Despite HMI Prisons raising this issue in 2016, there were still no accredited programmes for these prisoners. This represents an astonishing failure by the prison service, which has been far too slow in putting provision in place. Although the effectiveness of these programmes has, at times been questioned, if the prison service believes they are effective and necessary, they should make sure that the right prisoners get access to them.

"Other prison service bureaucracy was hampering progress. The lack of suitable dentist facilities meant that there was a huge waiting list and prisoners

had to be sent in small groups to HMP Thorn Cross for treatment. The governor was waiting to hear if he could have the funds to refurbish the existing dental suite, but progress on this application was slow.

"Since our last inspection, when we commented on poor living conditions, the situation had deteriorated, with parts of the prison now beyond repair. Progress had been slow in refurbishing the showers, some of which were in appalling condition; this had not been picked up by leaders' decency checks."

He added: "If Risley is to prepare prisoners adequately for their eventual release, it must provide far more purposeful activity that gives prisoners the skills and experience they need to settle successfully on release. The prison must also make sure that its critical public protection function is being met, particularly for the large population of prisoners convicted of sexual offences.



Warrington Own Bus Fare Reductions

Planners reject bid to extend former Chinese restaurant

PLANNERS have rejected a bid to extend the former China Rose Chinese restaurant premises in Culcheth, saying the development would be "over-dominant, over-bearing and create an intrusive feature" in the village.

The premises on Common Lane, Culcheth, have been empty for around three years and are currently semi-derelict.

A planning application by Red23 Property Ltd involved the demolition of porch to front, proposed two-storey front extension, single storey first floor rear extension on columns, proposed external staircase, cladding and new window and door openings to side elevation, together with relocation of external ventilation flue on rear elevation.

The application site is a two-storey, end of terrace 20th century property

in an end terrace. The proposal seeks to substantially extend the property and the restaurant capacity by the addition of a two-storey front extension. The total proposed capacity would be 89 covers and with 5 full-time staff and 10 part-time. There had been one letter of support and one of objection.

Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council had responded that they have no objections but noted consideration should be given to the licencing hours.

But Warrington Borough Council planners ruled that by virtue of

its location, scale and design, the proposal would result in a development which would be over-dominant, over-bearing and create an intrusive feature, out of keeping with its surroundings and which would consequently have

an unacceptable and detrimental impact on the street scene and harm the visual amenity of the area, contrary to Policy CS1 and QE7 of the Warrington Local Plan.

The decision was made under delegated powers.
