THE transformation of Warrington town centre is continuing at pace with planning permission now approved for 900 new apartments on part of the site of the Cockhedge Shopping

The proposals involve the demolition of 16 retail units to make way for 900 new homes as part of regeneration plans for the site that had been provisionally earmarked for a new much-needed

with Warrington Hospital failing in a bid for new build funding, it now remains to be seen which development will progress.

Town centre regeneration specialist, Altered Space, received approval for its plans submitted in January 2023, that aims to breathe vital new life into this popular retail destination, creating employment opportunities and increasing footfall. The development aims to attract new retailer, leisure, food and beverage operators.

In line with a larger Greater Cockhedge Master Plan approved in August 2022, Altered Space intends to create a more accessible and visually appealing shopping centre through this stage of redevelopment. The plan includes downsizing the shopping centre and removing the pedestrian bridge over Scotland Road, resulting in a downsized yet enhanced commercial offering.

If the proposal moves forward, it leaves a big question mark over the future development of a new hospital.

Walkers take to streets for Hope 100 suicide prevention walk

MORE than 250 walkers took to the streets of Warrington as five local organisations, committed to raising awareness of suicide prevention and the need for conversations, teamed up for the HOPE 100 walk.

Lead organisation Livewire Warrington Lifestyles team along with Warrington Speak Up, Warrington Foundation, Directions for Men and Warrington Veterans Community Support set off from the Halliwell Jones Stadium, coinciding

with World Suicide Prevention Day.
They were joined by Warrington
North MP Charlotte Nichols.

The name HOPE 100 was chosen because the International Association for Suicide Prevention who are the key instigators of World Suicide Prevention Day have the theme 'Hope through action' for this year. Also 1 in every 100 deaths worldwide is as a result of suicide.

Organisers believe that through open conversations, active listening,

asking questions, supporting people to access help, and challenging stigma around mental health, they can make a difference in Warrington.

The walk was happening for the 4th time but this year under a new name – it was previously called Darkness into Light and started at the stadium in Widnes and finished at the Halliwell Jones.

This year it was a circular walk starting and finishing at the Halliwell Jones. The walk was a 10.3-mile route largely on designated public pathways such as the Trans Pennine, Black Béar etc.

For those who couldn't walk the full distance, there was a more accessible route starting at Victoria Park

New Town inspiration!

Inspiration is an odd thing. I am not sure if inspiration is something that is given or whether it is taken but wherever you draw inspiration from, one word, idea or action can set off a number of unintended consequences sometimes welcome

off a number of unintended consequence and sometimes not so welcome events.

Take the creation of New Towns as an example. For those unfamiliar with New Towns or who didn't do geography O level (ask someone over the age of 50!) the New Towns programme was conceived in the late sixties to deliver much needed quality housing outside of the then City Centres. The New Towns themselves are now between 50 and 70 years

old and this should be of interest, as of course Warrington is one of them along with other highlights of town planning such as Crawley, Milton

Keynes. The idea was that the Government would create New Town Development Corporations that would create a modernist utopia to which people would flock, to escape inner city slum housing and look forward to a brave new utopian future, or something like

new utopian tuture, or something like that.

The reality, well that is still a matter for debate. Bearing in mind that the programme was started over 70 years ago and that they have been reviewed at least four times, it is still not clear if they were a success or not. I have been invited to speak at an event in October to discuss this again and see if we can still learn lessons from their establishment, so the debate still rages. My view, by the way is a qualified yes. The delivery of new homes was I think successful, they are still there and still in demand but the delivery of sustainable neighbourhoods and the shops, leisure and cultural activities that need to sit alongside them are probably only now being realised. Crumbling concrete shopping precincts (not Warrington any more obviously) are often cited as a failure of the programme and led to severe criticism under the Thatcher Government.

Government.

So why the connection between inspiration and the New Towns programme, well obviously if you are going to talk about something the first thing you do is google it and the top answer that comes from google is Warrington - Runcorn New Town Development Plan - 'Music for a broken concrete utopia'. This believe it or not is electronic music written by

Gordon Chapman-Fox and inspired by the formation of Warrington and by the formation of Warrington and Runcorn New Towns and how the problems of levelling up are still being dealt with today. Not what I was expecting but just goes to show that inspiration is an uncontrollable thing, particularly when you delve a bit deeper and see the amount of cultural and artistic activity that has been inspired by the New Town programme from paintings and photography collections and exhibitions to books and 80's electronica.

Judging by the minutes of the meeting of the Warrington and Runcorn New Town Board in 1968 I am pretty sure that the development of electronic music was not top out their list of outputs. Although if they were to listen to it, they might like it. But I am a bit of a fan of 80s electronic music as I was there the first time first time.

New CT scanner unveiled at hospital's Emergency Department

A NEW Emergency Computerised Tomography (CT) Department has been officially unveiled to staff and patients visiting Warrington Hospital.

The new £1.9 million CT Department is directly accessed from the hospital's Emergency Department (A&E) to speed up the transfer of patients requiring urgent scans. The scanner equipped with the latest technology makes detailed X-ray imaging available to clinicians 24 hours-a-day, supporting them in making urgent and often life-saving diagnoses.

alagnoses.

The new facility was part funded by NHS England who supported the purchase of a new state-of-the-art CT scanner alongside Warrington and Halton Teaching Hospitals' own capital investment programme. The Trust made it possible to reconfigure the department to accommodate the scanner and provide an improved environment for those undergoing urgent diagnostic scans. Patients will also benefit from increased privacy, as the department

has been thoughtfully designed with a two-bed waiting bay with ambient and skylight ceiling lighting in the scanning area to help put patients

more at ease.

A computerised tomography (CT) scan uses X-rays to create detailed images of the inside of the body including many structures including internal organs, blood vessels and bones. They can be used to diagnose conditions including damage to bones, injuries to internal organs and problems with blood flow which may be present in patients experiencing trauma, stroke or some cancers.

When not required for emergency care, the scanner will be used to support the wider radiography and scanning requirements for patients receiving care elsewhere in the

hospital.

This CT scanner is one of a series of improvements to improve the experience of patients in the Emergency Department, following the opening of a Same Day Emergency Care Centre in July 2022 and a recent refurbishment of the waiting

and triage areas.

Dan Moore, Chief Operating Officer said: "Our teams have once Chief Operating continued demonstrated commitment to providing safe care and the best possible experience despite high levels of demand for respire riigh levels of demand for emergency care and the challenges presented by the physical limitations of some of our older buildings.

"This new CT scanner situated

within the heart of our emergency care services will be a real boost to our capacity to carry out urgent diagnostic tests. Providing our emergency clinicians with timely information to make diagnoses or plan for the next phase of care and treatment for patients. treatment for patients will reduce any unnecessary waits in the department. Thank you to everyone involved in delivering this project."

The Community Action Fund makes £100,000 available for projects which benefit their local community by working towards improving the safety of individuals in the area.

Individual bids of up to £5,000 can be submitted by applicants who are working with their local policing team to address their area's priorities. Applications are welcome from community, voluntary or third sector groups, including parish councils. Applications to the Community


Action Fund must be match-funded to provide the maximum benefit to the area, resulting in the true value of the fund doubling to £200,000.


During the application process, applicants are also asked to name

Approximately 280 people thoroughly enjoyed an excellent, short electro-acoustic set of approximately 40 mins although it was originally scheduled for 30, and quite how the band selected the songs from such a huge back catalogue was beyond me, we could have easily been there all night!!

From the moment the band appeared the atmosphere was electric as they were definitely amongst friends and there was little doubt that James Walsh (Lead guitar and vocals), James Stelfox (Bass), Barry Westhead (Keyboards) and Ben Byrne (on Cahon) were 'up for it' as well.

"Good to be here Warrington!" from a smiling James was greeted with the usual whoops of delight from the excited groups of ladies before the band launched into 'Poor Missuided East."

PEOPLE of a certain age (author included), remember the world of vinyl records very well and it appears many younger music fans are returning to it and are clearly enjoying the world of the original (non-digitized) sound in all its glory.

reporting Warrington Worldwide popped along for a chat with owner Steve Davidson aka 'Diddy'.

Next time you are in Warrington

town centre or sat in the 9 Gallon real ale pub on Legh St enjoying a quiet pint, why not walk another 20 yards on the left to Lizard Records – keep your eyes peeled, you might not see it but you will hear it!

see it but you will hear it!

Crossing the threshold you will be greeted enthusiastically by 'Diddy', you might even recognize him as he has been a D.J since the age of 13 when he helped out at various shows by playing his own 'punk' set at Woolston Leisure Centre and the Cantilever Youth Club and continues to 'spin' records today at many of the testivals in town and beyond. During his time on the road Steve had amassed thousands of singles had amassed thousands of singles and albums of various musical genres

to cater for his increasing D.J spots. To the uninitiated, vinyl records (33 & 45's) can take up a lot of space and 45 s) can take up a lot of space and probably contain music you might not play again..... ever! Around 2010 -2012 (ish) the music scene was changing quickly and in Steve's own words he was "sick of looking at a huge stack of old Dance and Techno" and took approximately 2000 records to various charity shops ground town shops around town.

Roll forward to 2014, when Mike Roll forward to 2014, when Mike Wilkie – current owner of the 9 Gallon pub offered Steve a storage unit for his huge vinyl collection it dawned on him that perhaps he shouldn't have given away all that vinyl after all? Especially as 2 years later in 2016 Steve started officially trading as Lizard Records and had to go to fleat markets boot sales and to go to flea markets, boot sales and second hand shops to acquire more

As a former interior shopfitter Steve knew what was required in his new unit to make it into the authentic 'record shop' style that you see today and being a keen artisan he would love to see more environmentally friendly - second hand quirky trader's

in glass & ceramics, clothing, & furniture in the area – a kind of Afflecks Palace in Warrington. When I was there people were bringing in collections of all music genres for Steve to assess, and although he doesn't class himself as a business man he considers his venture more man he considers his venture more of a community service where you can buy or sell old vinyl, purchase re-issues or browse and have a chat whilst being educated about vinyl by Steve himself . Reader beware though, you will disappear down the rabbit hole, indeed a number of youngsters came in the shop to browse and eventually buy quite

Woolston Eyes and Willow Tit set to benefit from new funding to help endangered species

WARRINGTON'S Woolston Eyes Nature Reserve, home of the rare Willow Tit, is to benefit from new Natural England funding to help support endangered species.

It is one of 63 projects throughout Cheshire, Lancashire and Merseyside awarded a share of £14.5 million to support 150 species recovery across England.

Along with the Willow Tit, some of England's most rare and threatened species - including the large marsh

species – including the large marsh grasshopper, native white-clawed crayfish, lapwings and water Voles are to be supercharged on the road to recovery thanks to the multimillion-pound grant scheme.

The Species Recovery Programme Grant Scheme supports targeted action to recover our most endangered species. The funding will support efforts to fine-tune habitat conditions for our rarest species, and actions such as propagation, captive rearing, translocations, research and translocations, research and solution-trialling to find the best approaches to enable endangered wildlife to survive and thrive.

England's wildlife is pressures fragmentation, climate change and invasive species have created huge declines, with average species abundance falling by 52%. Numbers of the Duke of Burgundy Butterfly, for example, have declined by some 50% in the last 20 years. 20 years. Warrington,

Woolston

Eyes Nature Reserve, a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), has received funding to enable further improvements in habitat management, trialling techniques which aim to natural processes over extensive areas and to return the population of willow tits to their previous high

Willow tits are currently the fastest Willow tits are currently the tastest declining resident bird species in the UK with a 94% reduction in numbers since 1970. Woolston Eyes SSSI has traditionally been a stronghold for this species with 40 years' worth of monitoring data. Until recently the Reserve regularly supported a population of 25-30 breeding pairs fun to 0.7% of the breeding pairs (up to 0.7% of the UK population) but recent ringing

data shows an apparent decline to around 17-20 pairs. The project is being led by Woolston Eyes Conservation Group (WECG), a voluntary organisation that manages the site, which is owned by Peel Ports. The study and conservation of wildlife and habitats within the area will also support species such as soprano pipistrelle and brown long-eared bats, woodcocks and great crested power.

Amanda Wright, Natural England Nature Recovery Manager for Cheshire to Lancashire Area Team said: "Woolston Eyes is an amazing site for wildlife, providing a hotspot for so many species across a unique man-made site which is owned by Peel Ports, and supported by the RSPB.

"Woolston Eyes Conservation Group have created a mosaic of habitats across the site and with this funding will be able to support further wildlife benefits, especially for the endangered Willow Tit."

Other projects to receive funding from Natural England in Cheshire,

Lancashire and Merseyside include: Riverthrive by Cheshire Wildlife Trust. The project will create a network of interconnected wetland habitats across the landscape including ponds, reedbeds, riparian habitats and reprofiling canalized river sections.

It will also support the migration of the European eel and other freshwater fish by removing weir and penstock structures and and penstock reconnecting the river to its historic

Families can explore their ancestry and heritage thanks to a free genealogy service

A NEW family history service has been launched to help Warrington people delve into the past and unlock the mysteries of their ancestry.

Experts will be on hand from Warrington Family History Society on a monthly basis and can be found at Warrington Archives, inside Central Library in Museum Street.

Working alongside Culture Warrington, the friendly volunteers can give free advice to anyone, from beginners who want to look into their family tree but don't know where to start, to experienced researchers who have hit a brick wall and don't know how to get past it.

In recent years, programmes such as 'Who Do You Think You Are?' and 'DNA Journey' have helped increase interest in genealogy across the UK.

And now it couldn't be easier for people to make their own discoveries as the Warrington Family History Society team have access to billions of electronic records as well as a vast array of original historic documents held in Warrington's Archives.

The service has been rolled out after the success of similar schemes at Penketh Library and Lymm

Philip Jeffs, Culture Warrington's Archives Officer, said: "People who come to the help desks have all sorts of questions. Sometimes they are just curious about where they come from and what their ancestors' lives were like.

"Other times, they have very specific questions such as what their grandfather's role was during the First World War or where their grandmother was born.

"A lot of people who come to the help desks just have one nagging question about their family history that they just haven't been able to answer and it's fantastic when we're able to help them make a breakthrough.

"Between them, the volunteers from Warrington Family History Society have a lifetime of knowledge in the field and have probably come across every problem a researcher might meet."

Over the years, these enthusiastic and tenacious researchers have discovered all sorts of weird and wonderful facts.

Philip added: "Might your ancestor have been a juggler at the Gaiety Theatre? Or a war hero at the Battle of the Somme? Was your great grandfather arrested for stealing apples on Warrington Market, or rewarded for saving a drowning child from the River Mersey?

"Did your family come to Warrington to escape the potato famine in Ireland, or have they lived here hundreds of years? The possibilities are endless and Warrington Archives can help you start your journey into your family's past.

past.

"The stories you uncover can help to show how your family has become what it is today through all the hardships and the joys and highs and the lows your ancestors experienced through time."

resperienced through time."

The family history service will be at Warrington Archives on the following Saturdays between 10am

and midday – 23 September, 21 October and 25 November – with more dates to be announced.

Visitors do not have to book in, but are encouraged to email searchroom@culturewarrington. org in advance where they are welcome to send details of their enquiry before the meeting.

People who are not from Warrington are also welcome to attend as the team have access to vast collections of online records covering the whole of the UK.

Football club to host fundraiser for young fan battling cancer for a second time

WARRINGTON Town Football Club is hosting a special fundraising event to support a young fan battling a rare cancer for a second time.

The club is helping raise money to support the "most amazing family who are yet again going through such a heart-breaking time with a special event on October 7th at 7 p.m. with the chance of winning a signed Warrington Wolves shirt.

For any family having to go through cancer once is traumatising enough but to go through it a second is just heart-breaking. Callum's cancer had come back.

Callum, aged 15, who is a g fan of Warrington Town nd Warrington Wolves, has a rare genetic condition called neurofibromatosis, where tumours attach themselves to nerves in the

Most of the time his tumours are benign, however, they can turn malignant. When he was 10-yearsold he had a large tumour which was growing rapidly in his neck, this was removed and doctors told the family the heartbreaking news it was cancerous.

He underwent chemotherapy and proton beam therapy to treat the tumour and rang the bell for the end of treatment on his 11th birthday. He was also diagnosed with a brain tumour in 2016 which doctors said was a low-grade glioma and due to its location, the tumour cannot be removed.

In 2016, Callum had an operation to relieve pressure in the brain and had no issues until earlier this year.

Despite the setbacks, the football and rugby mad Callum tries to keep a positive mindset.

Tax Payable on Gifts and Entertainment

As we are now approaching the season of goodwill we thought that we would look at the tax payable on business gifts and entertainment.

1. Gifts

A gift is something that is given voluntarily to a person without receiving anything in exchange, or without any expectation of receiving something in return. Free samples to potential customers is advertising and are deductble. It could also be something supplied at less than the cost, when the gift is the difference between the cost to the trader and the selling price. Again, discounts such as a baker selling off fresh bread at the end of the day is not a gift as it a normal

Generally, the cost of business gifts is not an allowable deduction against business profits for tax purposes. However, there are a number of exceptions to this rule.

Firstly, gifts which contain a conspicuous advertisement for the trader are deductible provided that:

 It is not food, drink, tobacco or a voucher exchangeable

- The total costs of gifts other than the above to the same person in any tax period does not exceeds £5

A common example of an allowable gift is a diary, pen or mousemat

Secondly, gifts to employees are deductible provided that the gift is not also provided to others (but see below concerning tax incurred by employees).

Thirdly, gifts to charities are deductible provided that it is wholly and exclusively for the purposes of the tradé.

2. Entertainment

Entertainment is defined as the provision of free or subsidised hospitality. This can include, for example, food and drink, hotels or other accommodation, sporting events and facilities, theatre and concert tickets, and entry to clubs and nightclubs.

Whether a trader can claim tax relief on the cost of providing entertainment depends on to whom they are providing that entertaining.

If they are entertaining an

employee of the business, and the entertainment relates to their work, then the cost of providing that entertainment can be claimed as a deduction for tax purposes. However, if they are entertaining anyone else, such as a customer or supplier, then the cost of that entertainment cannot be claimed as an expense against taxable profits.

An employee is essentially someone on the payroll and being paid a salary. It does not include former employees, subcontractors or shareholders who do not work within the business. It also does not include a sole trader or a partner in a partnership.

If it is a mixed event for both customers and employees then the deductibility depends on the primary purpose. If that is to entertain customers but some staff are attending then the whole of the cost is not deductible. If it is to entertain staff but some customers are in attendance then the cost must be apportioned between deductible and non-deductible.

Whilst a trader may be able to claim a tax deduction on

the cost of providing gifts or entertainment to employees, the employees would need to pay tax on the "benefits" unless the total costs of gifts received is less than £50 or the entertainment is a "qualifying event". A qualifying event is one which is:

- 1. An annual event such as a Xmas party or summer BBQ, and which is
- 2. Open to all staff, and which (in total with previous qualifying events in the same tax year attended by that employee)
- 3. Has a cumulative cost of less than £150.

The cost of the qualifying event which takes the cumulative cost above £150 is wholly taxable as well as all future events in that tax year. So do not attend an annual BBQ in July costing £30 followed by the Xmas party in December costing £130!

Yellows part ways with number one



WARRINGTON Town have parted company with goalkeeper Tony Thompson by mutual consent.

Thompson, 28, made 50 appearances for the Yellows last season in their Northern Premier League campaign that ended in promotion.

He started the National League North season as number one, keeping three clean sheets in six

keeping three clean sheets in six appearances, but was then absent from the club's next three games.

That had led to some speculation surrounding his future, with the club now revealing his exit.

A statement said: "After being left out of the starting team for the trip to Brackley Town recently, he expressed his unhappiness at the decision and wanted to be in a position where he was playing every week. every week.

"Both parties have therefore agreed to a termination to enable Thompson to explore opportunities

elsewhere.
"The club would like to thank Thompson for his contribution to bringing National League football to the town and wish him well for the future.'

The only game Thompson missed last season was through

the suspension handed to him for his controversial red card in the FA Trophy defeat to Guiseley, which resulted in national headlines over a visiting supporter urinating in his water bottle.

Formerly with Altrincham, Thompson's arrival was seen as a coup last summer following Altrincham's decision to go full-time, which resulted in the departures of several players.

What turned out Thompson's last game for the Yellows was the 4-1 home defeat to Curzon Ashton.

Dan Atherton, who returned to the club in the summer after a season away, started with defeats away at Brackley and Banbury, either side of the gripping 3-3 draw at home to Spennymoor Town.

Despite the scorelines, Atherton shone in each of those fixtures. He was an ever present in the 2021/22 season as the Yellows lost to Scarborough in the play-off final, before he moved on to the Welsh Premier League and then Hyde United.
