

Green Belt plan to convert barn into dwelling at Grade II Listed farm approved



PLANS to demolish agricultural buildings behind a Grade II Listed farmhouse on Green Belt land at Croft and replace them with a single dwelling have been approved by planners.

The próposal involves conversion of agricultural buildings to create a residential dwelling and associated works including demolition at Barrow Farm in Croft. The application site consists of a cluster of former agricultural buildings at Barrow Farm, Kenyon Lane. The site is located in the

Green Belt. proposed development The involves the conversion of an existing farm building into a single dwelling, including a single-storey rear extension to provide a kitchen and a detached carport to the front of the property. A number of existing farm buildings would also be demolished.

The barn to be converted is of red brick construction with a dual-pitch roof. The proposed dwelling would be two storey with four bedrooms. A large parking area would be provided to the front of the dwelling which would utilise the existing vehicular access from Kenyon Lane. The proposed carport would be of timber and brick construction with a dual-pitch roof. The carport would be located to the west of the house close to some of the remaining farm buildings.

A similar development was previously approved at the site for the conversion of the barn into two dwellings.

Amended plans were negotiated and submitted by the applicant and have resulted in changes to the original submission, which can be summarised as:

- Reduction in the proposed number of dwellings from two to Reduction in one
- Relocation of extension to northern elevation and carport to west of southern elevation
- Removal of proposed roof lights Reduction 'n the scale of proposed windows
- Alteration of proposed facing materials to extension Removal of proposed new vehicular access from Kenyon Lane

There were no objections to the development which has been approved under delegated powers by Warrington Borough Council planners.

Brave mum speaks out to encourage young riders to be safe following death of teenage son

A brave mum is sharing the story of her teenage son, who was tragically killed in a motorcycle collision at Winwick, in a bid to stop any other families going through what they have. On 21 July 2021, Harry Abbey, 19, from Culcheth, was travelling to work on his motorcycle whon he

to work on his motorcycle when he was involved in a collision with a combine harvester at the junction of Hollins Lane and Watery Lane, Winwick.

He was sadly pronounced dead at the scene, and now – just over two years on – Harry's mother, Bev, is teaming up with Cheshire Police to encourage young riders to ride safely.

Bev has given Harry's bike to the Constabulary to be used by the roads education team who will take the bike – which has been secured to a trailer – to schools and colleges

across the county. Bev and Harry's three siblings, Amy, Lucy, and Tom have also bravely opened up on the impact losing Harry has had on them to show to young people that their lives matter to those they leave behind – and encourage them to take road safety seriously. The video was released on

Cheshire Police's social channels and is also being used in schools and colleges across the county. PC Darren Daniels, Road Safety Education Officer for Cheshire Constabulary, said: "1 attend schools and colleges across the county all the time educating and encouraging young people on how to stay safe while driving their cars or riding their bikes – yet serious and fatal collisions still happen.

"We want young people to understand that they are not invincible, and their life matters. It matters to those who are left behind dealing with the consequences and I hope that by Bev bravely sharing Harry's story – and using his bike as an educational tool - we can make a real difference and help to reduce the number of young people who are needlessly killed on the

county's roads." Bev Abbey, Harry's mother, said: "Losing Harry has been one of the most traumatic experiences of mine and my family's life. That pain, it doesn't go away, it will be there all the time – you just make more room for it and learn to live alongside it. "I want young people to know want young people to know

that they have a responsibility for not only their own lives, but a responsibility to come home – back

to the people that love them." John Dwyer, Police and Crime Commissioner, said: "It was really important for me to provide funding to help promote road safety amongst young people, often as their inexperience on our roads can lead to collisions and fatalities. We know that the 17 - 25 age bracket sadly make up a large proportion of incidents on our roads

"Making Cheshire's roads safer is a key priority in my Police and Crime Plan, and this bike is one

way in which we can educate people about the importance of sharing the road.

"I want to thank Bev for making the brave decision to let Cheshire Constabulary share their story. Harry's life mattered, and his family's support for this campaign

will help to prevent more young people being killed on our roads." Statistics show that 55% of people killed on a motorcycle in 2021 and 2022 were between 17-26 years old and 40% of those were teenagers and all of them were boys.



Plan approved to demolish car wash and create EV charging zone

PLANS have been approved to demolish a car wash at Culcheth and replace it with an EV charging zone.

The proposals involve the demolition of car wash and the creation of a charging zone, the erection of EV chargers, the



erection of a canopy, sub-station enclosure and associated forecourt works at Culcheth Service Station,

Warrington Road, Culcheth. A condition includes the use of the EV chargers only to be operable between 06:00hrs and 23:00hrs on any day. The units shall not operate outside of these hours. There were no objections to the

plan.

The proposal seeks to remove a car wash building located towards the rear of the forecourt and erect 7no EV charging bays with contiguous canopies. Each charging station would be 3m wide and would contain an EV charger, each to a maximum height of 2.23m and maximum width on a flat top of 0.85m and with a slimline profile of 0.42m. Each station will have an individual LED downlight to achieve 100 lux on each bay.

A cantilevered canopy which would be enclosed at the rear would shelter each station. The maximum height of this structure would be 3.3m with the main vertical support being 0.61m wide. The canopy section would project a further 2.5m above the EV charger area.

Planners acknowledged that both the agent and the applicant worked with Warrington Borough Council to achieve the highest standards of design and development

Gustaffson was formed by former Great Sankey High School student, singer & songwriter Andrew Gower, in 2020 with lifelong friend and guitarist James Webster.



Office plan above Indian restaurant rejected due to unsightly fire escape

PLANNERS have rejected an application to allow office space above an Indian restaurant at Glazebury, due to an unsightly metal fire escape at the rear of the premises.

The application involves the site of the Chennai Indian restaurant at Glazebury, an inset settlement within the Green Belt.

The main building, originally built as a public house, is located in the northern half of the site and on the junction of Warrington Road and Lately Common, a no-through road leading to Ward End's Farm and residential properties lying to the west of the application site. The southern half of the site provides a parking area for the business.

The rear garden of a row of terraced properties run along the southern boundary of the site. A neighbouring residential property also borders the western boundary of the site.

The site lies within Flood Zone 3, although benefits from flood defences.

The proposal involved a change of use of the first floor of the site from a restaurant to offices. The ground floor of the site will remain a restaurant. The alterations to the exterior of the building include a metal staircase giving access to the first floor, which has already been constructed. An uncovered bin area and a cycle stand are proposed next to the staircase. These alterations will be on the building's elevation facing Warrington Road. The submitted plans indicate that 3 parking spaces will be allocated for the office's use between the hours of 8 am-6 pm.

Planners say the change of use for part of the site from a restaurant to offices is a change that does not require planning permission, both being in the same use class and as such an assessment of the impact on the amenity of the surrounding area is not required. Given that the proposal involves minor changes to the exterior of the building, of which none of the nearby dwellings will have a direct outlook, the proposed development will not have unacceptable detrimental impacts on the amenity of residents.

However, the proposal's alterations to the exterior of the existing building include the installation of a metal staircase on the elevation facing Warrington Road. This is to provide access to the first floor of the site which has already been built. The design of the staircase, metal and industrial in appearance, does not harmonise well with the building, the existing street scene and the wider area.

street scene and the wider area. The area beyond the application site is typified by residential dwellings further south and open, greenfield land bordered by mature trees on the other side of the road to the restaurant and further north. The staircase is therefore assessed to not be in keeping with the area and to be detrimental to its character. A small bin area, with storage for three or four bins, is also proposed next to the staircase, this has not yet been built. No cover or screening bins is indicated on the plans. The assessment made of the staircase is also considered to apply to the proposed bin area. The staircase and bins will combine to create an unpleasing visual addition at the side of the road which will not harmonise well with the area and have a detrimental impact on its character.

Impact on its character. The metal staircase that has been built and the bin area that is to be provided to the exterior of the building, has an unacceptably intrusive and detrimental impact on the street scene and the character of the area.

Warrington Borough Council planners have rejected the application.

weekend activities.



A temporary 30 mph speed limit is set to be introduced on the Winwick Link Road in Warrington, to allow for highway works associated with the Parkside development at nearby Newtonle-Willows.

The temporary speed limit could be for up to 18 months while works are ongoing.

Warrington Borough Council has given notice it intends to make an Order under Section 14 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984. The effect of which will be to introduce a 30 miles per hour speed limit restriction on the following lengths of road: Winwick Link Road from its junction with Waterworks Lane

to its junction with Winwick Lane; Winwick Lane from its junction with Winwick Link Road to the Borough Boundary with Wigan.

The Order will be effective from 27th November 2023 for 18 months, as and when signed on site. The restrictions are required to allow for highway works associated with the Parkside Development to take place.


