THE old saying "a week is a long time in politics" certainly rang true in the corridors of power at Warrington town hall.

First leader Cllr Russ Bowden and his deputy Cllr Cathy Mitchell, both announced in the space of 24 hours

that they would not be seeking re-lection in the elections next May.

This was soon followed by news that they would both be stepping down from their roles and now the Labour group has a new leader and deputy, to be ratified at a meeting of the Full council on December 4th.

Cllr Hans Mundry, Transportation, Highways and Public Realm, has been selected as leader while Cllr. Janet Henshaw, Sustainability and Climate Change has been selected as deputy following a group meeting at the Town Hall.

Cllr. Mundry represents Latchford East while Cllr. Henshaw represents

Great Sankey North & Whittle Hall.

While the announcement was sudden, it was maybe not surprising following the ongoing pressures at Warrington Town Hall with the huge £1.8b debt hardly ever out of the headlines.

This has resulted in a lot of noise on social media and a lot of it personal attacks on Cllr. Bowden and Cllr. Mitchell.

Cllr Bowden announced he would not be standing next May due to significant personal challenges" putting immense strain on his family, while Cllr. Mitchell took the "difficult decision" to stand down due to the challenges faced as a woman, the

personal exposure endured and the "lack of effective and timely safeguards" hindering professional, personal and family life.

Temporary measures to discourage town centre traffic set to become permanent!

TEMPORARY measures to discourage traffic from Warrington town centre are set to become permanent after being deemed successful by highway planners.

The temporary measures on Winmarleigh Street, Barbauld Street and Sankey Street in the town centre were introduced as part of a package to prevent and discourage through traffic movements within the core of the town centre.

Warrington Borough Council says the routes on which these measures are located are ones that have historically been subject to significant through or rat-running movements to avoid congestion on the adjacent 'A' roads.

They say the restrictions have been successful in reducing the level of through movements to very low levels, creating an improved environment within the town centre for pedestrians and cyclists.

Now a traffic notice has been issued to make the temporary measures permanent. Any objections can be made to the council by December 7 via TROrepresentations@warrington.

Multi-million pound investment will breathe new life into landmark Grade II Listed buildings

NEW life will be breathed into two landmark buildings in Warrington town centre with another multi-million-pound investment to create a second boutique hotel offering.

Following on from the success of the first Deuce Hotel development at the nearby Old Post Office Building, local property developer Danny Inman has successfully bid to be the preferred developer for the Grade Il listed buildings on Sankay Street post to the town hall

the Grade II listed buildings on Sankey Street, next to the town hall. With the nearby Old Post Ofice facility already proving to be a great success, Danny sees the new buildings as a natural progression. Bank House (No 88) has been vacant since 2014 when it ceased to be used by Golden Gates Housing Trust as an operational office.

Danny said: "Work won't start until early 2024 as we have to go through the planning process and listed buildings process with the council to get approval for the

Warrington Borough Council see the proposal as regenerating an area of unused vacant land, providing a quality development next to the Town Hall and bringing two landmark buildings back into





Divorce Column

Q. Am I right in thinking that if myself and my ex can't agree on the arrangements for our children over the Christmas period we can ask a court to decide?

Christmas is a special time of year for families and for young children in particular and I would encourage the pair of you to work very hard at trying to agree and to find a fair compromise but if you really can't agree then yes, either of you may apply to the family court for an order to determine the arrangements. But there would of course be a cost associated with this and for many people Christmas is expensive enough without adding to it with legal fees. If the court does have to decide it will make whatever decision it thinks is best for the children because whenever the family court has to make decisions about a child the paramount consideration is the child's welfare. Depending on the specific circumstances I would expect the court to take the view that it is best for the children to see both parents over Christmas and so to find a way of enabling them to spend some time with each.

Q. I have discovered that earlier this year my husband had an affair with another woman but he says he ended it months ago and that anyway he'd deny it in court if I tried to divorce him for it. I don't feel that I can trust him anymore so how do I go about proving it?

A. Actually you don't have to. Gone are the days when you need to prove fault or wrongdoing as we now live in an era of 'no fault' divorce which means there is no longer any need even to allege blame let alone prove it. If you feel that your even to allege blame let alone prove it. If you feet that your marriage has irretrievably broken down and you want a divorce then you're entitled to apply for and be granted a divorce without alleging any basis for it and regardless of your husband's wishes and denials. The process would likely take about 6 months but there may be other aspects to resolve which could take longer, such as sorting out a financial settlement and / or settling child arrangements.

Care home placed in special measures

A Warrington care home has been placed in special measures after being found to be "inadequate" following an inspection by the Care Quality Commission (CQC).

The inspection of Callands Care Home followed concerns about the management of the services.

the management of the service, medication, and people's nursing care needs with a requirement to improve following four previous

inspections.
The last inspection was published on 21 March 2021. The provider completed an action plan after the last inspection to show what they would do and by when to improve. At this inspection, inspectors found the provider remained in breach of

regulations.
Callands 'care home' provides accommodation, nursing and personal care for up to 120 younger and older adults; some of whom live with dementia or physical disabilities. At the time of the inspection, 109 people were living at the home across four separate units. Issues found at the home, included only one activity coordinator for 109 people, with limited activities available.

The CQC expect health and social care providers to guarantee autistic people and people with a learning disability the choices, dignity, independence and good dignity, independence and good access to local communities that most people take for granted. Right support, right care, and right culture is the statutory guidance which supports CQC in making assessments and judgements about services providing support to people with a learning disability and/or autistic people. They considered this guidance as there were people using the service who have a learning disability and or who are autistic. who are autistic.

The inspectors found that people were not involved in their care planning. Care plans were not reflective of people's needs and lacked person-centred details. Risks were not always assessed. There was only one activity coordinator available to provide support to 109 people, there was limited activities available. The environment was not supportive of people living with dementia there was limited signage to promote independence.

People were not supported to

of their lives and staff did not support them in the least restrictive way possible and in their best interests; the policies and systems in the service did not support this

The service had an inconsistent staff team and high agency use. This meant staff were not always aware of people's needs. People's communication needs were not always recorded and there was a lack of awareness of how to apply national best practice supporting people with a learning disability and autistic people.

Some inappropriate language was used when referring to people

who used the service.

Although some people had individual ways of communicating, using body language, Makaton (a form of sign language), pictures and symbols, this was not documented which meant staff were not aware of how best to communicate with people to provide effective support

people to provide effective support and encourage independence. Staffing levels and shift patterns were insufficient to enable all people to access the community to pursue their leisure interests and form meaningful relationships within their lead community. within their local community.

Staff did not always have the

training and skill needed to support people effectively. Some staff had poor relationships with each other and management. Staff did not always feel management were approachable and supportive.

Governance processes were not always effective in the monitoring of the service. Whilst some of the concerns were identified through the service's own provider audits, they had failed to rectify the concerns raised.

The overall rating for this service was 'Inadequate' and the service was therefore in 'special measures'.

This means the CQC will keep the service under review and, if they do not propose to cancel the provider's registration, they will re-inspect within 6 months to check for

significant improvements.

For adult social care services, the maximum time for being in special measures will usually be no more than 12 months. If the service has demonstrated improvements when next inspected and it is no longer rated as inadequate for any of the five key questions it will no longer be in special measures.

At the time of the inspection, there was not a registered manager in post. A new manager had been in post for 4 months and had submitted an application to register. The CQC is currently assessing this application.

A spokesperson from HC One who operate the Callands Care Home said: "Our priority is the health and wellbeing of our residents, and we always take all feedback from the regulator seriously. We are disappointed in the outcome of the latest CQC inspection, and acknowledge that we fell short of the high standards of care our residents expect and deserve.

"Since the CQC inspectors visited our home in September, we have already made progress in line with our comprehensive action plan. We have implemented additional leadership in the home, and have provided our staff with

enhanced refresher training.
"With the support of the Local
Authority and CQC, and under the
guidance of our new experienced Home Manager, we are continuing to work hard to make and embed the changes needed at the home. "All of us are united in our mission to ensure that our Residents receive the best possible quality of care."



Former office building to become children's home



A FORMER office building at Orford can be converted into a children's home, planning chiefs at Warrington have decided.

The property – originally built as a shop – is in Catterall Avenue and has stood empty for some years

A new bungálow will bé built on the site to enable the development to house six children with complex needs and up to 11 staff.

Nearby residents have been consulted on the scheme and there were no objections.

Warrington Borough Council planning officers recommended the

scheme be approved and indicated the proposals would result in an improvement in appearances.

A number of trees would be lost, but these would be replaced and the development would be complemented by soft landscaping.

The borough's development management committee was told there would be 11 staff on duty during the day and four at night.



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Action ongoing after residents raise concerns over hotel-based asylum seekers

A Woolston Cllr. says he will continue to press the Home Office for action over young male asylum seekers being housed at the Holiday Inn following a recent Working Together meeting in the area.

Cheshire Police recently hosted a meeting in Woolston to discuss various concerns, including the housing of asylum seekers at the hotel and anti-social behaviour in the area.

A number of matters were discussed at the meeting and officers are now working closely with Warrington Borough Council, Woolston Parish Council and the local community to address the concerns.

Following the meeting, local cllr Rob Tynan said: "Since it was announced that Woolston would be housing asylum seekers under the Asylum Dispersal Scheme I have continually supported residents and worked with them to end the use of hotels in our area. While I know people are sympathetic to the plight

of asylum seekers, they are worried that they have not been consulted on exactly who is being housed there.

'I am grateful to Superintendent Adam Ross for increasing the police presence across Woolston, especially around anti-social behaviour around hotspots

'Residents are rightly concerned, and I share their concerns, I hope that the increase in police visibility will help make residents feel safer.

"Cheshire Police have reiterated, and I echo their comments, if you are in an emergency, please call 999 or if you witness anti-social behaviour please call 101 even if it is a minor

"I continue to press the Home Office for action over the housing of young male asylum seekers in our area given the burden on our local services. Small boat crossings are down, and the Government are taking action to secure our borders compared to Labour who not only have no plan to stop the boats, but they also has no desire to either. At every opportunity they do everything to stand in the way of action that would make a real difference – voting against our small boats legislation over 50 times.

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

Merry Xmas everyone!

In years past we have spoiled your Xmas build-up by giving you details of what was in in the Chancellor's Autumn Statement. Unfortunately, as we write this there is still nearly a week to wait until we know what we will be facing next year. We could speculate, like many of the other papers, but will only depress you once when we actually know what the new measures are.

However, there are a couple of things that we already know.

Firstly, the Chancellor has already confirmed that he will safeguard the "Triple Lock" this year. Under the Triple Lock, pensions increase by the greater of:

- Wage inflation in the year to September, which this year was 8.2%,
- Consumer Price Index for the same period, which was 6.7%, or
- 2.5%

There is some speculation that he may exclude certain one-off pay rises awarded to public service employees. If he does then the increase of 8.2% as above would be

reduced to 7.8%. Either way, the increase will make a further substantial contribution towards offsetting the freeze in pensions of a decade ago.

The "New State Pension" for the current year is £10,601, If the full increase of 8.2% is applied then this would increase to £11,470 per annum, or £220.58 per week. If the smaller wage inflation figure is used then the new rate would be £11,427 per annum, or £219.76 per week.

The second thing of which we are already aware is that the Personal Allowance is being frozen at the current level of £12,570 until at least 2028. This is the amount that you can earn before you pay income tax. Ignoring the cumulative effect of the treeze last year, this is effectively a tax increase for basic rate taxpayers of about £210 per annum.

Whilst it can be seen from the above that a pensioner with no other income is currently below the tax threshold many pensioners do have additional incomes, such as savings income or private pension income. Currently, pensioners need to have additional income of £1,969 before they start to pay tax. Next April, the additional income needed to bring a pensioner into tax will tall to at least £1,143. It is estimated that this could affect as many as 200,000 people! It is also interesting to note that even if pensions increase by the lowest of the triple lock amounts, ie 2.5% each year then by 2028 the whole of the personal allowance will be used by the state pension.

For those pensioners that are affected, there is a further affect which they should be aware of if that additional income comes from sources other than earnings or private pensions. Employees and people with private pensions will generally have any tax due deducted at source under Pay As You Earn (PAYE). However, PAYE cannot be applied to savings income or to state benefits. Therefore, many of the pensioners who are dragged into tax by these provisions will only become aware that they owe tax after the end of the tax year and will then be faced

with having to meet their tax liability as a lump sum.

However, enough of all this talk of taxes. Whatever 2024 holds for us, we still have Xmas to look forward to. The directors and staff of WatkinsonBlack would like to take this opportunity to wish you and your families a very Happy Xmas and a prosperous New Year

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More challenges ahead for **Warrington Town**

PLANS for required ground development at Cantilever Park have been approved by town planners, but Warrington Town chairman Toby Macormac admits there are still plenty of challenges ahéad.

The Yellows have brought the highest level of football the town has ever seen this season, and currently sit eighth in National League North – the sixth tier of the football pyramid.

Following their there is a requirement to upgrade Cantilever Park to meet the next level of ground grading as stipulated by the FA.

This includes the creation of a

self-sufficient, segregated away end – comprising of seating and terracing, toilets, food/drink facilities and separate turnstiles

– as well as numerous other
improvements within the ground.

One of the most costly is the requirement to widen the concreted areas around the pitch to ensure capacity is maintained in those areas, as well as the installation of steel handrails in all standing

The projected cost of that work has already put paid to plans to install two additional terraces to accommodate home supporters, which were shelved until a further date when the planning application was submitted back in September.

was submitted back in September.
The current application was approved by the development management committee meaning focus can now turn to the funding and execution of the plans.
Work has to be done to satisfy the FA's ground graders by the end of March 2024, otherwise the Yellows face relegation from National Legaue North – regardless of their

League North - regardless of their

league placing.
Macormac said: "Even though the planning application has passed, it doesn't alter the fact that we've now missed the November funding window due to delays in various areas.

"It now means we're going to have to do as much work as we can ourselves and reduce the grant application (to the Premier League Stadium Fund), so that when the money does drop in February, we can complete the work before the March 29th, as we'll need ground grading visits ahead of the deadline.

"The plan now is to take some stuff out of the funding application things like the snack bar, toilets, some of the pathway work and handrails, and try and get as much of this work done ourselves.

"Then hope the money drops in February and pray to God we get all the work done by March 29th.

"It's easier to remove stuff that you can only qualify for 50% funding for, rather than the ones you get 70% for. Fans will have seen we have started to tape off some areas where some work will be done.

"We've had a hammer blow from United Utilities too, that the cost to connect the sewage up from the toilet block to the sewer in the adjacent road is going to be between £6,000 and £12,000 because of the depth we have to dig down, so we're going to alter the design and fit a septic tank behind the 3G area.

"The hole in funding that we anticipated was £80,000, and we estimate around £20,000 will be covered by the groundfunding

campaign going on."

The Yellows average crowds have risen by a further 50% in the 2023/24 season, with the average up to 1,040 for this campaign.

They are yet to welcome some of the bigger supported clubs to Cantilever Park too, with the likes of Scunthorpe United, Hereford and Chester all still to visit.

Performances on the pitch, with one of the lowest budgets in the league, have them just a point off

the play-off places.

But as Macormac has said previously, this season is about staying in the division – both on and off the field.

The club explained in a statement that no funded works are allowed to commence until the money lands, leaving a tight deadline for the Yellows to meet come the spring. More than £10,000 has so far

been raised by an online fundraiser by the club.

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
