Lymm Councillor announces retirement

FORMER Tory group leader on Warrington Borough Council, Cllr. Kath Buckley has announced she will be retiring from the council ahead of the forthcoming elections on May 2.

Having had cancer twice, Cllr Buckley, who at one time was the only Conservative member of the borough council, before becoming group leader, feels it is now time for retirement.

Reflecting on her career as a Cllr. and various voluntary roles in her home village of Lymm she said: "I started by being a scout leader when my son was young, then I became a Parish Councillor – I was Chair of the Parish – and on various committees, I then became a Borough Councillor in 2015.

in 2015. "As a Parish Councillor, for example, I sorted out the parking in front of the Coop on Cherry Lane ie only for one hour, instead of commuters using it. I have in my time as Borough Councillor – sorted out the lowering of the speed limit on Burford Lane, when the residents asked for help, I was the only councillor who turned up. This took nearly two years to sort. I worked with many organisations to sort out the flood defences for Reddish Lane after they were flooded twice in two years. I sorted out with WBC the crossing at Sainsbury's after elderly residents brought their issues to my attention. I have also been Chair and Secretary of Lymm May Queen, Governor and Trustee of Lymm High School and a member of 4Lymm." Looking to the future she added: "I am still a member of LYCA board and and I organised the competition for their successful Logo change. I am still Chair of Lymm Clothing Charity, Church Warden and Safeguarding officer, and member of the Christmas Tree Festival Committee for St Mary's Church. I am still Chair of Warrington CAB. Most recently I lead the writing group for Lymm and Thelwall U3A and I have just joined Bridgewater Players. I am also a volunteer for the Heritage Centre. I will still be on my committees in Lymm etc so hopefully will be still helping the residents of Lymm for some time yet.

"Finally, it has been an honour to serve the people of Lymm."

A body was sadly found following a canal barge fire during the early hours of Friday, March 8, on the Bridgewater Canal at Lymm.

At 03:25 fire crews from Stockton Heath and Lymm were called to tackle the fire on a canal barge near Brookfield Road. Firefighters wearing breathing apparatus used a hose reel jet to put out the fire. An investigation to establish the cause

is taking place. A Cheshire Police spokesperson said: "Shortly before 4.05am Friday 8 March, police were called to reports of a fire on a canal barge on the Bridgewater canal in Lymm.

On arrival at the scene, officers found the barge which was well alight. Firefighters from Chartie Fire and Porcus Service Cheshire Fire and Rescue Service

extinguished the fire.

"During a search of the boat officers sadly discovered the body of a man who was pronounced dead at the scene. Formal identification has not yet taken

place. "A "A joint police and fire investigation is being carried out to establish the cause of the fire, although at this time the death is not believed to be suspicious.

St Rocco's confirm Lymm book shop closure despite residents' fears it will be damaging to village

WORRIED Lymm residents have been raising concerns over the proposed closure of St Rocco's Book Shop at Lymm fearing it will damage trade in the village, with other shops also rumoured to be closing due to increased rents.

Although St Rocco's say keeping the shop open is not viable, some residents believe it is doing well and providing a valuable service to the village.

They say it attracts people into the village from outlying areas and that because of the range of books available at bargain prices is helping to encourage children to read.

Books were originally sold in the main St Rocco's charity shop in Lymm, and residents suspect that the books will go back to the other shop. But they argue that only a restricted range will be available because of restrictions on space.

It will also mean there will be less room for other items, such as toys and children's clothing.

One resident who contacted Lymm Life said: "Closure of this shop will be damaging to the viability of the whole village centre. Rumours are circulating that other shops are also going to close. "The problem is that Lymm,

"Bookshop users will be aware of the book sale held over the last few weeks. This has led to a massive increase in the shop's turnover, a factor that does not appear to be recognised by the St Rocco's decision-makers. "The proposal seems to be

classic case of short-termism and will have a number of knock-on effects. The number of books on display will be drastically reduced, possibly by 50%, which will ultimately be selfdefeating in terms of revenue. This reduction will also affect the number of children's books available, at a time when we should be encouraging our children to read!

'We are well aware of the strong feeling about this news, not just from the inhabitants of Lymm, but from people who come from miles around purely to browse in the shop. They welcome the social contact provided the shop. This will have an adverse impact, not just on St Roccos but on Lymm commercial outlets generally, as yet another quality retail outlet will be lost.

"While we appreciate that St Roccos is a charity organisation whose role is to raise funds for the hospice, it is clear their actions will lose them the good will of the local people and will, ultimately, backfire."

Confirming the closure of the book shop a spokesperson for St Rocco's Hospice said: "As has been covered widely in the press recently, this is a very difficult time for hospice funding and our retail team at St Rocco's must make sure we are maximising the return on our efforts to maintain the valuable services that we offer to our patients and their families. "We have been reviewing our

retail operations across the town and have developed a long-term plan to increase the contribution that we can deliver for St Rocco's.

"As part of this, as the lease for the Lymm Book Shop was at an end, we reviewed its viability as a standalone shop and concluded that we can return more by combining both operations in Lymm into one

"Our fantastic volunteers in Lymm do a brilliant job to support the hospice and we are grateful for everything that they do. We hope many of those who have worked in our book shop will choose to continue to help us run the combined shop.



Battle to block plans for electricity sub-station fails

BATTLE to block plans for А an electricity sub-station in a conservation área at Lymm has been lost

Twenty three nearby residents, Lymm Parish Council and borough councillor Graham Gowland councillor Graham Gowland opposed the scheme, on land off Mayfield View, Lymm.

But Warrington's development management committee approved the scheme after planning officers said the development would not have any detrimental impact on residential amenity.

The site is off Mayfield View, Lymm, about 150 metres from Lymm Hall, which is Grade 2* Listed and has a number of other heritage assets

within its grounds.

Objectors were concerned about noise issues for residents of Mayfield View and Rectory Lane, likely antisocial behaviour in an unlit access path leading to the sub-station and

doubts about the need for the facility. But planning officers said the substation was needed for five dwellings already being built near to Lymm Hall

Any harm caused to the character of the area would be less than substantial. It was unlikely the substation would need to be accessed on a regular basis so there would be no unacceptable disturbance for existing residents from comings and goings.

They've come from lots of different backgrounds, age-ranging from 16 all the way up to 40. Some have come straight from college, and others have done different job roles first." One of those apprentices is Samii Johnson, who moved into the profession after being an estate

agent. Samii said: "If someone was thinking about joining as an apprentice, I would say to go for it. I've come in here at 29 and I'm not going to say I'm old by any means, but I did feel very conscious and I've been welcomed with open arms and I feel very comfortable. I think at any age or point in life, it's a great decision."

Clare also featured on BBC Radio S Live during Apprenticeship Week as a guest, discussing the benefits of a multi-generational workforce, with a focus on Generation Z's

impact. She said: "We are having more of Generation Z coming into the workforce, such as school leavers. Their perceptions and expectations of work have changed, and I think work in general has changed, but we now have a real blend of different generations who work across our nurseries, and I think there are real benefits to that.

For us particularly in an early years sector, the children benefit well from all those different generations as well and those experiences, and there are lot of positives that generation Z have brought to the workforce." **Do Something Big Campaign**

Lymm singer-songwriter releases album and prepares for fundraising concert

"Jake has always been a great inspiration for my writing," says Paul. "My satirical songs deal with subjects including the shipping forecast, Trump, marriage, relationships with technology, and even the B word.

Paul unearthed the lost Thackray songs in TV, radio and film archives while researching his acclaimed biography, Beware of the Bull – The Enigmatic Genius of Jake Thackray. The book, which he wrote with his friend John Watterson, was included in the Daily Telegraph's pick of the best music books of 2022.

Is it safe for my pet to eat spring plants or flowers that start growing during spring?

during spring? It is lovely seeing all the spring bulbs coming through, but some bulbs are toxic if ingested by our dogs. Daffodils, bluebells and tulips tall into this category, as well as indoor plants such as lilies and amaryllis. Lilies, for example, are of high risk to cats, and even small ingestions can lead to severe kidney domage can lead to severe kidney damage. Always check the toxicity of plants and flowers in your garden or home.

Are there any specific parasites I should be concerned about as the weather gets warmer in April?

As temperatures rise in April: As temperatures rise in April, the risk of parasites like fleas and ticks increases. It is important to ensure that you check your pet regularly, and if you frequently walk your dog around woodland or parks a regular preventive treatment is a sensible idea. Consult with our team to choose the appropriate products and to discuss any concerns about parasites local to our area.

My pet has seasonal allergies that seem to flare up in April. How can I help them?

suffer from seasonal can Pets allergies, often aggravated by increased pollen levels. Symptoms can include itchy or red skin, fur loss, anal gland irritation, itchy ears and watery eyes. Often allergies can settle down on their own and using a hypoallergenic shampoo may help, but many pets need medication to alleviate their discomfort. There are lots of different ways to help manage irritation. Please call our team to discuss the best options for your pet.

As spring gardening begins to get under way, are there any fertilisers or garden products I should avoid



using around my pets?

using around my pets? Many common gardening products, including fertilisers, insecticides and weed killers, can be harmful to pets if ingested. When choosing products for your garden, opt for pet-friendly alternatives. Always store garden chemicals out of your pet's reach and prevent access to treated areas for the recommended period on the product labels. If you suspect your product labels. If you suspect your pet has ingested a harmful substance, contact us immediately.

How bad is it if my pet eats chocolate and how can I keep them safe at Easter?

Chocolate is not safe for pets to eat. It contains theobromine and caffeine, both of which can be toxic to dogs and cats. The level of toxicity depends on the type and amount of chocolate consumed and the weight of your pet. Darker and more concentrated chocolates are more dangerous. Symptoms of chocolate poisoning may include vomiting, diarrhoea, rapid breathing, increased heart rate and even seizures

To keep your pet safe during Easter: • Store chocolate securely and keep

- all chocolate products well out of reach. This includes Easter eggs and chocolate decorations.
- Educate family members and ensure that everyone in the household understands the dangers of feeding chocolate to pets.
- Provide pet-safe treats so they can participate in the festivities without the risk.
- If you suspect your pet has eaten chocolate, contact us immediately. Prompt action can be crucial.

Your pet questions answered March sees LymmPaC extend its support for parents and carers

Have you heard about Lymm PaC? Are you aware of Lymm Sanctuary Hub & Business Centre, which operates the project? And do you know a local parent or carer of a child or young person with SEND that could benefit from more support?

March has been significant for LymmPaC as an increase in demand for its support services has led to the set-up of a second (evening) group.

At a time when there are a number of awareness occasions related to SEND, including Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month (1-31 March), Neurodiversity Celebration Week (18-24 March), and World Autism Awareness Day (2 April), we asked LymmPaC project lead, Jodi, a few questions about the group and how it can help local people. What is LymmPaC? It is a friendly peersupport group.

What is Lymmrac ? It is a friendly peer-support group for parents and carers of children and young people who have SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities). The project is run by Lymm Sanctuary Hub and Business Centre, a Lymm charity partly funded by the National Lottery Community Fund Fúnd.

Fund. Why was the group started? It can be a very lonely place for parents and carers with a child on the SEND pathway. There are support groups across Warrington but attendance can be difficult as it involves travelling. The Lymm group offers a meet-up with other local people in a similar position. How does the group help? The group is not led by experts

but by parents of young people with SEND. It is a place to share experiences and advice over a cup of tea with others who will listen and understand. It offers people an hour each week out of the hectic schedule of appointments and meetings to unwind and offload in a safe

supportive space. When & Where does LymmPaC meet?

Drop-in sessions are run by the Hub every Wednesday from 10-11am in Lymm Library (the Library is closed to the public at this time).

For those who aren't free in the daytime, an evening group will begin on 2 April and run 7-8pm on the first Tuesday of each month in the Event Room of the Hub (within the Library building).

All parents and carers of children with SEND are welcome and sessions are free, for adults only, and run termtime only.

How can I find out more? For more information about LymmPaC, email: pac@lymmsanctuaryhub. co.uk. There are also Hub open events featuring the projects and services offered from the site. Event dates as well as further details about groups and services are shown at: www.lymmsanctuaryhub.co.uk.

Chambers Fletcher Solicitors **Divorce Column**

No fault divorce

Arguably the biggest reform of divorce law in England & Wales for 50 years came about 2 years ago yet to this day I meet such a lot of people who know nothing about it and are surprised when I make them aware of the change.

So called 'no-fault divorce' was officially introduced in England & Wales on 6th April 2022 under the Divorce, Dissolution and Separation Act 2020. That said, a previous version of no-fault divorce did in fact already exist under the Matrimonial Causes Act 1973 which set out 5 'Facts' for divorce – at least some of which most people are aware of – namely, adultery, unreasonable behaviour, desertion, 2 years separation and consent, and 5 years separation (with or without consent). Therefore, the two separation based Facts actually amounted to a no-fault divorce under what is now known as the old law.

But upon the DDSA 2020 coming into force the 5 Facts under the MCA 1973 were removed and so it came about that it is no longer necessary to establish any of the previous 5 Facts in order to apply for and obtain a divorce. The concept of fault has been completely removed and there is no longer any requirement to even allege, let alone prove, blame. All that is required now is for the divorce application to be accompanied by a statement made by the party applying (the applicant) that the marriage has broken down irretrievably and this will be taken by the court as conclusive evidence that the marriage has irretrievably broken down

Further, there is little scope for the receiving party (the respondent) to defend the divorce because under the new law the only basis for disputing a divorce is (a) to dispute jurisdiction, (b) to dispute the validity of the marriage, or (c) to assert that the marriage has already been legally ended. In the absence of establishing one of these then the court must make a divorce order.

While the new law has simplified the actual divorce process, and there are equivalent provisions for dissolving a Civil Partnership, it is important to note that the new law has not in any way changed the way in which property, financial claims and child arrangements matters are dealt with and I will write further on these topics in future articles.

Treasure trove of memories of Lymm man who saved The Wire

A treasure trove of memorabilia of former Warrington RLFC Chairman Sir Ossie Davies, the man who saved The Wire, has come to light, sparking memories of the club's Wembley triumph 50 years ago this year.

It is now hoped the collection memories of Sir Ossie, who helped save the Wire from going out of business in the early 1970s, can now help raise funds for the club's Squadbuilder, promoting homegrown talent and the club's Foundation

Items in the collection, unearthed by his son Neville, include matchday programmes, including several in mint condition from the 1974 final as well as autographed items, including the Wembley Final banquet menu, signed by both clubs

Reflecting on his memories of Warrington RLFC Neville said: "My first memories were as a child going to matches, which were usually on a Saturday afternoon. My mum would be dropped off in Warrington to do

be dropped off in Warrington to do some shopping, whilst I went with my dad to the match. "Bridgefoot was chaotic with hordes of supporters walking to the match. In the early fifties, the Wilderspool would be packed with over 30,000 attending matches over 30,000 attending matches.

It was usual for spectators to pass children above their heads to get to the front where they could see and then after the match, there would be a shout for everyone to stay in place until the children were reunited with their parents.

"There would always be shouts of 'give the ball to Bevan' a brilliant fast winger in his time. Harry Bath would kick goal, many times so powerful that it regularly ended up over the stand and in Fletcher Street.

"The main railway line ran at the corner of the pitch and the train drivers could often be seen watching the match from their appropriately positioned train for as long as they were able.

"It was in 1971 that my dad bought the rugby club. It had been losing £500 per week and this was not sustainable. At that time there were eighteen home matches a year, which could not finance the

"Whilst the team had good players, they were all getting older and were not replaced by younger

"After the match, when Directors went into the boardroom, the regular drink was whisky and milk, which I have never heard of before or since.

"When my dad became Chairman of the Wire, with Brian Pitchford as Director and Philip



Worthington as Secretary, they set about big changes to the Club, including the building of the new Wilderspool Centre which would cater for other sports and leisure facilities with restaurants, bars banqueting suites and conference facilities at a cost of \$300,000. This would ensure that the club could continue without total reliance on

the game alone. "In addition to this, there had been alterations to the area beneath the main stand to provide a bar and accommodation for the supporter's

"One Christmas, there was a very keen frost forecast and I was asked to take a tractor and trailer load of straw from our friend Chas. Wiiliamson's farm at Warburton to the stadium to spread on the pitch to avoid having to cancel the customary Boxing Day match between the Wire and Wigan. On the morning of the match, the straw had done its job and I joined a large team of volunteers and staff and went to Wilderspool to take the straw off the pitch. Later that week, Chas took his bailing machine and we removed everything from the

touchline. "I used to travel on the team coach to away matches quite often and as I was a similar age to many of the players, children used to come to the coach and ask for autographs, including me. I always said I was not a player, but some insisted they had seen me play. Rather than argue and upset them, I used to sign my own name for them

and they went away happy. One season, Mike Nicholas had dyed his hair what could only be described as almost yellow and Murphy told him he was like a flashing light running around the sitch

pitch. "I remember well the Cup Final in 1974. I travelled on the team coach and soon after we arrived at Kensington Palace Hotel, Kensington Alex Murphy took all the squad into Kensington Palace Gardens opposite the Hotel for a short training session. We had not been there long when the Park Keeper came and told us we could not play ball games in the Park. Murph replied that he had permission, to which the Park Keeper went away to check. Murph then told us he did not have permission, but by the time the

parkkeeper returned, the training session would have finished. We visited Wembley Stadium in the afternoon, which was an experience in itself. On the day of the match, we were greeted outside the Hotel by Police outriders who were going to escort us to Wembley. The police officer in charge came and had a talk with the Barry Cooper Coach driver who had taken us and asked how fast the coach would go. He then told the driver to keep tight up to his motorbike and not to stop for anything. His team of police officers would stop all the adjoining traffic and we were to keep going close behind this rider. Police Motor



Cyclists Kept 'leapfrogging' past us to get in front and stop traffic, as we moved forward regardless. At one stage, the Policeman in charge came alongside our coach and asked the driver if he had still got his handbrake on. Our poor driver was already wet through with sweat, as this was a journey to be remembered.

"Needless to stay, Murph not being one to miss an opportunity Wembley, breaking in now and then to tell the players to wave at their loyal fans who lined the latter part of the route.

"As we approached 'Wembley Way', there was no visible way through crowds, but appearing from nowhere were five Mounted Police. They came alongside and instructed our already stressed driver to keep the coach in between the back two horses. We set off with one horse at the front, two behind him and the two behind him we had to keep in between. What an experience, we started to move forward, the front horse started to do a big bouncy step forward, which it had obviously been trained to do. The crowds parted when they saw this horse coming and we went through like a snowplough to the entrance. On arrival at the entrance, all five horses formed a line around our coach to allow us to get off.

There were 13 players and two substitutes allowed for éach game in

"When we had won the cup in 1974, the security guards insisted that they kept close to the cup, but Ocker was having none of it and convinced the guards that he would take good care of it and it was said he even slept with it in his room. He proudly displayed it in the coach all the way home and for those who remember Ocker, they would know that no one would have taken that cup from him. "It seems strange now to look back

on the 1970s when the programme for the 1974 final announced that tickets were available for the 1975 Rugby League Cup Final at Wembley and were priced at £3.50; £2.50; £2.00; £1.75 and £1.00 standing

"There are so many memories, but it always sticks in my mind how my mum, who did not really

understand the rules of rugby always contradicted the referees' decisions if they dared to give a penalty against the Wire. The best was Billy Thompson who would come into the Boardrom after a match, go straight to my mum and say ' haven't I had a wonderful game today, were you pleased with my decisions?' My mum fell for this every time and you could imagine the answer she gave, even though Billy was a top referee and rarely got his decisions wrong. "Kevin Ashcroft even made mention of this in his book, as one

of his memories of the Club. "I worked with several of the

players at Fairclough's when we were building an extension to the Fibreglass Factory in St Helens. In the 1970s players all had jobs and would be working up until lunchtime on a Friday and finish early and go straight to Wilderspool ready for an evening match. This was due to £8 for playing and £30 for a win. "Dave Chisnall worked with me at Pilkingtons on their Fibreglass extension and was having a discussion with one of the engineers on site and the engineer who did a lot of running asked Dave how someone his size could run. He had obviously not seen Dave play and so Dave challenged him to a race. We set up a one-hundred-yard track on a concrete section of the contract and the race was on. Dave left the engineer way behind, and Dave's ability to run was never questioned again.

"My wife, Kath and I on occasions used to host prospective signings when they came up with their families to see the area before finally signing. I well remember the time when Frank Reynolds, his wife Susan and children Kerry, Paul and Louise came to our house and we took them to Chester Zoo for the day to keep them out of the way of other club scouts. Frank was signed from Aberavon RU Club and worked as a rigger at Shell at Ellesmere Port.'

It is now hoped the treasure trove of memories can help raise funds for the club's Squadbuilder to help support the talent of the future and the work of the Warrington Wolves Foundation.


