need to be kept out of the public domain, I also fully understand the reasons why Cllr. Johnson took the decision to leak the location. At the end of the day he is elected to represent local people and he felt on this occasion, the need for people

to know outweighed secrecy while a deal was completed.

The problem we now have is how are we going to find a suitable transit site which the council has a legal obligation to find?

This is the second time in about 10 years a suitable location has been found and the second time the location has been leaked, leading to it being scrapped.

So, what is going to stop the next location being leaked? At the end of



the day few people want a transit site on their doorstep.

So, what is the solution - well how about some common sense?

Travellers want to be near motorway networks and we have service stations up and down the country - so why not just designate transit sites up and down the country attached to service stations?

We even have a new service station being built near Croft on the motorway network while the Poplars by fields and seeking expansion. Would these locations not provide

a solution with all sides happy? Or is that too much just like common sense? It could even be a condition of planning consent that a traveller site is part of the development!

The Raven fighting back after road works

THE roadworks which engulfed the Raven Inn at Glazebury have now finished and as predicted, the severely restricted access to the community pub has had a negative impact on business.

The road closure took place with little warning as the contractors started the road works in the wrong order.

Spokesperson Peter Sturman commented: "It was very obvious the roadworks would adversely affect the Raven. September was a very poor month, particularly during the weeks when evening weekday access was denied for patrons from Culcheth direction.

"We maintain Warrington Borough Council (WBC) should have informed us of the possibility of the roadworks twelve months prior to them starting. We know the work was scoped at least 16 months prior to it commencing. As it was, we got 14 working

days notice. Even then the advice contained mixed messages. What's more, it was only on the second day of the roadworks that we got the definitive direction on vehicular access, after we and Culcheth Life Editor Gary Stentelbery had chased the council'up.

"We will kick December off with a Christmas Fair inside the space above the pub, on Sunday 1st December."



Independent councillor celebrates "victory for whole community" as council abandon transit site plan

INDEPENDENT Cllr. Neil Johnson is celebrating a "victory for the whole community" as he accused Warrington Borough Council of a "selfish act of bravado" over secret plans for a gypsy traveller transit site at Kenyon Lane, Croft.

He also described council claims that they were withdrawing the plans due to bad press and social media comments after he controversially leaked the location of the Kenyon Lane site as "rubbish!"

Cllr. Johnson resigned from the Labour Party before disclosing the "secret" location of the proposed site which the council had already spent £25,000 on trying to secure a land deal.

Following the announcement, Cllr Johnson said: "I am pleased that Warrington Borough Council have finally listened to the residents of Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft and withdrawn their ridiculous plan for a gypsy traveller transit site on Kenyon Lane.

"This is a victory for our whole community. The voices of local people have been heard because we banded together and refused to be steamrolled.

be steamrolled. "However, this decision could have been made a lot sooner. It was obvious that a transit site could never be built at this location because of issues with access, narrow roads, the suitability of nearby services, and a host of other reasons. Instead of withdrawing this nonsense sooner, Warrington Council engaged in a selfish act of bravado by trying to struggle on. As a result, Labour councillors have cost the taxpayers of Warrington £25,000. They should pay this money back from their own hopeless pockets or have it deducted from their allowances. Why should we fund their incompetence?

"I would like to thank all the residents who worked with me on my campaign against the transit site. I do not regret revealing the secret location for one minute. The people had a right to know. I have met with dozens of people in Culcheth and Croft about this issue over the last couple of weeks. We have worked together on reasonable alternatives, a business case against the Kenyon Lane site, and much more. I have been proud and pleased to put local residents front and centre of everything I do. Together, we have triumphed. "All of this has been achieved

⁷⁷All of this has been achieved without any input from my fellow ward councillors or the local MP. They shamelessly abandoned the people of Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft in their hour of need and we will never forget that. If they had any good grace or integrity left, they would both resign. "Finally, I turn to the Council's

"Finally, I turn to the Council's claim that they have withdrawn their plans because of bad press and social media comments. What rubbish! They have had to withdraw them because the community came together and worked with the landowners to prevent their sale. Councils do not make decisions because of things people write on Facebook. If Councillors and officers can't handle a bit of criticism and scrutiny, then they shouldn't put forward ridiculous proposals in the first place. "I am looking forward to continuing to work for the good of my community shoulder to

"I am looking forward to continuing to work for the good of my community, shoulder to shoulder with local people as their independent voice for Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft." Announcing their decision to abandon the Kenyon Lane site and

Announcing their decision to abandon the Kenyon Lane site and seek an alternative Warrington Borough Council issued the following statement.

following statement. "The Council has, for many years, searched for a location for a gypsy traveller transit site. We have an obligation to provide suitable pitches for the gypsy traveller community, in a sustainable location that is supported by access to public services. The council spends over £150,000 a year managing over 70 unauthorised encampments. This has a negative impact not just on council finances, but also on local communities, businesses, and the gypsy traveller community themselves. "On 14 October, the council's cabinet took the decision to acquire land off Kenyon Lane with a view to locating a transit site, a proposal that would have subsequently involved extensive consultation with the local community. We have spent over £25,000 in preparing the option to acquire the site, which itself would be subject to planning consent and independent scrutiny by the Secretary of State. The disclosure of confidential information ahead of the Cabinet's meeting has resulted in social media content that has been upsetting to some of those involved. We have therefore decided not to progress with the acquisition of the land and will continue to search for an alternative, suitable site."

In response to Cllr. Johnson's criticism Charlotte Nichols said prior to the plan being scrapped: "Residents have raised concerns with me about a potential traveller transit site near Kenyon Lane in Croft.

"These are sensitive matters for the community. The Council must be comprehensive and inclusive during the decision-making process.

the decision-making process. "I remain in conversation with Warrington Borough Council regarding these specific proposals, and in more general terms on the wider issues caused by a lack of appropriate transit facilities in Warrington."

Following Cllr. Johnson's "inaccurate statement" fellow ward Cllrs. Janet Seddon and Matt Smith, who both live in the ward issued the following statement: "We welcome Warrington Borough Council's confirmation that they are no longer planning to purchase the former Kenyon Lane Nursery as a potential traveller transit site. While Warrington desperately needs a well-managed transit site to address the illegal encampments we've seen on Culcheth Village Green, Silver Lane, and other areas, we agreed with residents that this particular site was not suitable. "The local Labour team, including

"The local labour team, including all of our Borough and Parish Councillors, have worked tirelessly to support the residents most affected by this proposal. We have been in constant communication with Council Officers, the Council's Chief Executive, and members of the Cabinet. As elected representatives, we are fully committed to serving our community, and any online claims suggesting otherwise are illinformed and untrue.

"We have been working at all levels to ensure this proposal was withdrawn. Crucially, our experience working with the Council has allowed us to effectively engage with decision-makers to secure a satisfactory outcome for the residents we represent. We would also like to thank the residents who contacted us; we greatly appreciate your support and the professionalism with which we were able to collaborate in opposing this proposal."



Council maintain dark unlit road meets safety guidelines to walk to school

HIGHWAY planners at Warrington Borough Council maintain that a dark unlit road at Croft meets Road Safety Great Britain guidelines for children to walk to school.

It follows a campaign by local Councillors at Croft, Matt Smith and Cheyvonne Bower, who have joined parents in opposing the council's proposed changes to suggested school commute walking routes for children. If a child has to walk over three

miles to their nearest secondary school or if the route is considered too dangerous, they are provided a free school bus pass.

Cllr Smith says the council has chosen to reassess all walking routes previously considered too dangerous for school children to use and that some routes, like Lady

Lane at Croft, that were considered hazardous in the past, are now rated as 'available' for use by children.

Cllr Bower says over 100 metres of the Lady Lané route is unlit, has no payement and the council's own data shows that the average speed of vehicles there is well over the speed limit.

out a Council ″W/~" Warrington Borough Council spokesperson said: "Walking routes to school are assessed by our highways teams according to Road Safety Great Britain guidelines, which focus on the interaction between pedestrians



and traffic.

"While no road is entirely without risk, Lady Lane has been assessed as having very light traffic, which is also visible from a distance due to the straight line of the road. This means the road is considered available to walk down with road safety in mind, such as wearing clothing to improve visibility and walking with an accompanying friend or adult if necessary.

"This assessment presumes that all road users will behave responsibly, follow the Highway Code and also crucially drive to the conditions of the and

"If parents/carers or children are uncomfortable with this route to Culcheth High School, an alternative is available via Lord Street.

The council is also continuing to provide transport for low-income tamilies and children who meet the home to school transport help criteria, which is based on government guidance.

But one concerned parent said: But one concerned parent saia: "This decision by the council to deem Lady Lane an acceptable route for children to walk to school is an accident waiting to happen. In my opinion, WBC have manipulated the data to produce a report that benefits only themselves without any consideration to the without any consideration to the safety of the children." Another said: "We shouldn't be

expecting children to walk down lady lane, no pavement part of the way and poorly lit. We should be encouraging them to go to school not asking them to do a nearly 6 mile round trip to get there and back. WBC need to reassess and get this changed."

Another added: "This is an absolute joke. I'm sure members of Warrington Borough Council wouldn't want their kids walking down Lady Lane with no pavement, streetlights and a blind corner!! I will be appealing the decision for my son and will keep appealing until they get sick of me! Absolutely appalling!

Back to the dark days of the 1940s

MEMBERS of Croft WI were taken back to the dark days of the early 1940s when journalist Roger Blaxall gave an interesting and poignant account of the experiences of children evacuated from war torn Liverpool to Ormskirk during WW11.

Roger brought along many artefacts from that time including photographs, press clippings, identity cards and even a small suitcase belonging to his mother-in-law who was an evacuee as a seven year old.

The trauma of being sent to live with complete strangers and parting from parents were recounted by Roger and how children of that era had to be extremely resilient. It was not compulsory for parents to evacuate their children, but not doing so was frowned upon and a newspaper cartoon of the day showed a family enjoying a picnic with an image of Hitler smiling in a tree intimating that not evacuating children was not good as they would be caught in the blitz.

Roger had taken part in the compilation of many publications relating to those times and the experiences of the people involved. He's also been instrumental 'instrumental in organising reunions for the evacuees. Two ladies in particular were mentioned who had not seen each other since 1940! In fact most of the people attending these reunions were meeting up for the first time in many decades, not

just with fellow evacuees, but also with the families who took them into their homes.

It's hard to imagine in this day and age what it was like to be a child having to part from parents at a railway station, herded onto a train carrying just a small suitcase of clothes, a gas mask, a luggage label tied to their coats and being transported to a completely alien environment.

The children from Liverpool sent to Ormskirk were initially taken to a school which is now a furniture store where they were billeted with various families. Quite a number of siblings were parted being billeted with different families. Schools were attended on a half day basis, local children in the mornings and evacuee children in the afternoons, then vice versa on alternate weeks. There was some antagonism from local children to these kids with strange accents and unfortunately some local unfounded propaganda against the "scouse children. Happily most families were kind and welcoming and life long friendships were formed.

Members enjoyed a questions session, but only one turned out to be an evacuee from that era. Secretary Louise Geekie gave a warm vote of thanks. The competition "A Modern Day Evacuee Label" was won by Jill

Hillam, 2nd Louise Geekie and 3rd everyone else who took part.
