The project to create a peace centre, the brainchild of Tim's mother Wendy, was to have a living memorial to the two boys who tragically lost their lives following the bombing atrocity which also saw more than 50 innocent shoppers injured, some of them badly.

While the use of the building is changing to a SEND education facility, it will still have the ethos of supporting young people and continue to be a fitting tribute to the two boys.

I find it baffling that no assurances can be given regarding the boys' names being retained on the building – and from our online reporting, it is clear most people agree that the names should be retained on the building forever more.

Meanwhile, I would like to thank Colin and Wendy for all their endeavours over may years for ensuring good triumphed over evil.

It has been said many times the bomb attack on Warrington became a major turning point in the troubles and a lot of this was down to how Warrington as a town and a community, responded to the bomb attack, by offering the hand of peace.

Colin and Wendy were at the



forefront of this, with much support from Warrington Borough Council and church leaders.

They and the boys have left a legacy they can be truly proud of, as can Warrington as a town.

Let's just hope common sense prevails and the boys' names can continue to live on, where they rightfully belong, on the Peace Centre.

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Peace campaigner implores council to keep boys names on iconic building

PEACE campaigner Colin Parry is imploring Warrington Borough Council to retain the names of Tim Parry and Johnathan Ball on the iconic Peace Centre.

As the Tim Parry Johnathan Ball Foundation charity, set up by Colin and Wendy Parry in memory of the boys killed by an IRA bomb attack on the town over 30 years ago prepares to vacate the building, no assurances have been given that the boys names will be retained on a proposed SEND educational facility for youngsters with special

needs.

The borough council is in the process of purchasing the building, which was jointly owned between the Peace Foundation and the NSPCC, to transform it into an educational centre for youngsters post 16 and post 19, with special educational needs. The sale completion is expected to go through by the end of March, around the time of the 32nd anniversary of the IRA Bridge Street bombing which claimed the lives of the two boys and injured 56 shoppers.

Colin said: "I Hope the name of the building will continue with both boys' names for emotional and practical reasons. It is a massive part of our town and how it responded to the bombing.

"I accept the purpose of the building will change but I implore the council to keep the boys' names attached to the building. I think it would be a very poor decision if the boys' names were removed."

Meanwhile the charity will

Meanwhile the charity will formally cease trading in its current form and become a "grant making" charity.

Colin added:" The fact that the Foundation would have celebrated its 30th anniversary in March 2025 is, in itself, a great milestone

that Wendy and I would never have imagined we would reach, but the endless struggle for sustainability, and the fact that time and age has caught up with us both, means that this chapter in the Foundation's history, will close, but as it does so, a new chapter will begin.

"With our 50% share of the

"With our 50% share of the proceeds of the sale (the other 50% goes to the NSPCC, as co-owners of the Centre), we plan to start the next chapter, as a 'grant making' charity.

In our new guise, we will invite applications for funding from charities and not for profit organisations, which share our aims of reducing the threat and reality of violence in our society, and particularly violence against women and girls, and young people of all genders, race and faith, who are targeted by extremists.

"This change to our business operations does not, of course, preclude people helping with our funding needs," he added.







Pioneering health and wellbeing project launched

A pioneering wellbeing initiative, Digi Care Health UK, is set to transform the lives of 29,000 households across Warrington, marking a significant step toward addressing quality of life and health challenges in the town.

Starting in Warrington Digi Care Health UK is poised to become a national model for health and wellbeing innovation, improving quality of life for those most in need and allowing more people to receive care at home, taking pressure off NHS beds and social

Digi Care aligns with the government's mission to build a future-ready health and social care system. The initiative focuses on reducing health inequalities, driving economic growth, and improving financial sustainability healthcare delivery.

The project, launched at Warrington & Vale Royal College today, Friday, supports national and Integrated Care Board (ICB) ambitions to shift healthcare from hospitals to community-based prevention and care models. Key areas of focus include addressing multi-morbidity and leveraging advanced digital infrastructure such as high-speed broadband and telecare/telemedicine technologies. The initiative will and telecare/telemedicine technologies. The initiative will also lay the foundation for a new Neighbourhood Health Service, enabling innovative approaches to healthcare delivery.

Central to Digi Care Health UK is the rollout of high-speed broadband fibre across local communities, facilitating the transition from analogue to digital systems. This

infrastructure will also underpin broader community wellbeing objectives, encompassing mental health support, community safety, and enhanced reassurance for residents.

The project, which will be piloted in the Central 6 wards of Warrington, starting with 300 homes, is being delivered by a diverse partnership board that includes:

Workwear company primed for growth after double management buyout

A WARRINGTON-based workwear company is primed for growth under new ownership after a double management buyout.

J & K Ross, of Kerfoot Street, Warrington and manufacturing business Dale Techniche, which is based in Nelson, Lancashire, have nearly 50 staff in total and a combined turnover of £10m.

They have been acquired from the Ross family for an undisclosed sum by a management team led by Neil Wilcock.

A team at north west law firm Bermans, comprising corporate partners Charlotte Mills and Laura McMorland and solicitor Nathan Hughes, advised the management team on the double buyout.

J & K Ross, which was founded by Jean and Ken Ross in 1976, supplies safety workwear.

supplies safety workwear, protective and hi-vis clothing, uniforms and PPE to companies in sectors including utilities, logistics, manufacturing, construction, oil and gas, chemicals and petrochemicals.

At its Warrington the business has a retail shop alongside its offices, warehousing, embroidery and printing embroidery operations.

The Ross family acquired Dale Techniche, which makes health and

safety workwear, flame-retardant

clothing, racewear and flight wear such as pilots' uniforms, in 2003. Following the deal, J & K Ross and Dale Techniche continued to trade as standalone businesses

Divorce top tips

Green light for £32m care facility on former school site

CABINET members voted to approve a 64-bed care facility on the site of a disused school in Bewsey, Warrington, which will cost more than £32m.

The Bewsey Old School site in Lockton Lane, Warrington, will be redeveloped as part of the proposals to create an intermediate care facility allowing patients to remain in their homes following stays in hospital.

Cllr Maureen McLaughlin said intermediate care "enables more people to live independently at home for as long as possible." The proposal would create "sufficient bed based facilities for the next 20 years plus." It was part of a plan to deliver "joined up and seamless health services" delivering care "in the right place at the right time". The current provision of services across the town is described as "fragmented" in the report and Padgate House is "not fit for future provision." The facilities, which will be based in close proximity to Warrington Hospital, will create facilities "with significant privacy and dignity."

She told councillors at Warrington Town Hall on Monday night that there was a need to replace the ageing facilities at Padgate House, which will be sold. The corridors at the current facility are too narrow and the building is in a poor condition, she said. There are no ensuite facilities for residents.

Doing nothing re Padgate House "is not an option" due to the building failure and maintenance costs. The new facility will address the need for a care facility now and for the next 20 years. If the issue is not addressed, it could result in "longer stays in hospital" which would impact waiting times for other patients. Construction costs are estimated at £32.2m excluding VAT. The capital finance regime would be delivered in partnership with NHS Cheshire. A further report will be presented to Cabinet to appoint a construction contractor and approve a final budget. Extensive public consultation has already taken place "and is the recommended service option of both health and service care commissioners to recommended service option of both health and service care commissioners to meet future need," the report said.

The design contract for stages four to seven of the development, is to be awarded to Ellis Williams Architects Limited.

The care facility proposal was unanimously approved by Cabinet members.

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


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Fond farewell for town's longest serving LPU Inspector and Chief Inspector

More recently, as Chief Inspector, Rob held the positions of LPU Commander at Runcorn and Detective Chief Inspector for the Northern Area. In addition ne Normern Area. In adaltion to his command at Warrington LPU, Rob serves as Cheshire Constabulary's force lead for robbery investigations as well as night-time economy policing.

Outside of work, Rob is married

with two daughters. He enjoys spending quality time with family and following football.

Upon his appointment as Chief Inspector for Warrington, Rob expressed his pride, stating: "I am extremely proud to serve as Chief Inspector at Warrington. My colleague Chief Inspector Nati Development of the Inspector National Police of the Inspector Inspe Neil Drum is leaving the LPU in a very healthy position but my role is crucial in continuing to ensure our officers receive the support necessary to meet the needs and

expectations of our residents.
"I have a deep personal connection and investment in this town, having spent several years

Neil began his policing career in 1997 as a Police Constable with the response team at Warrington's Arpley Street Station and wanted to join Cheshire Constabulary because its upstanding reputation.

Following his start in Warrington, Neil then became a Detective Constable with the town's CID unit, before being promoted to the rank of Sergeant in March 2003 and serving in Wilmslow, Widnes and Warrington in Patrol, Detective, Neighbourhood and Staff Officer

The majority of Neil's work as centred around protecting and serving Warrington's neighbourhoods. In 2010, Neil was appointed to the Town Centre Neighbourhood Policing Unit (NPU) Temporary Inspector role for 14 months.

His time here would greatly benefit the town, with the NPU being awarded the Keyin Brinkman Northern Area Award for making a significant reduction in crime and

a significant reduction in crime and incident demand and an effective robust policing approach.

Neil then led the Warrington Central NPU, the largest NPU in the Northern Area from 2012.

In July of 2015, with the introduction of the Local Policing Unit model, Neil would become Neighbourhood Inspector, meaning he was in charge of managing all six Beat Management Teams that sit six Beat Management Teams that sit

Neil has served at Warrington at PC, Sergeant, Inspector and Chief Inspector rankings and is the

Chief Inspector rankings and is the longest-serving Inspector and Chief Inspector to serve in Warrington.

Neil said: There is never a quiet day here at Warrington, it's fast-paced and demanding, so you are never bored – I will miss that pace and I will miss the vibrancy of working at Warrington and I will certainly miss the people.

"The journey we have taken over the last few years in terms of our performance improvements and making a difference and keeping people safe has been superb and that is down to the work of everyone here at Warrington.

"We have some fantastic officers, staff and volunteers at Warrington who do some tremendous work

who do some tremendous work day-in-day-out to help keep the public safe. To lead people like that and to do extraordinary things has been an honour – that I would say is the highlight of my career. "I have seen many people come and go from Warrington, many

and go from Warrington, many leadership teams change and other changes and many serious and tragic big incidents, but the pinnacle of my career has been leading Warrington LPU. I am very passionate about policing in Warrington and keeping people safe, so to obtain the post of Chief Inspector has been an absolute

privilege.
"I extend my sincere thanks to everyone who works and has worked at Warrington LPU, and across the Northern Area, for their outstanding work, dedication. Over outstanding work, dedication. Introduction

Chair and Chief Executive's Report

Welcome to our latest annual report.

We are both so proud of what our team have achieved during the past year. Through our services and extensive community engagement programmes, we listen, learn and respond to the thousands of disabled and older people, carers and families we work with, and together we strive to find solutions to their everyday challenges. We have also shared insights gained from hearing about their lived experiences with policy makers and service providers.

Our Energy Team engaged with nearly 8,100 vulnerable people at community events and reached 34,000 more via our social media channels. They provided energy efficiency measures, income maximisation and successful referrals to local partner agencies. They received over 7,000 emails and telephone enquiries, and worked closely with health and social care, including the NHS respiratory service, community centres and wellbeing services.

In collaboration with the Torus Foundation and other partners, we have delivered employment and training support to over 200 disabled people. We have continued to use our position as a Disability Confident employer to assist local businesses, including training over 250 senior managers from companies such as United Utilities.

Digital inclusion has been front and centre of our work, internally we have upgraded our IT systems and externally, through financial support from NHS Cheshire and Merseyside Transformation Fund, we have supported over 100 vulnerable people to get connected. This funding also supported an indepth review of assistive technology available in our Smart

Our 33rd annual Disability Awareness Day, held in July, attracted nineteen partners, who together provided the financial support, enabling us to run the week of events that, along with Sundays main show, attracted over 21,000 visitors and involved over 1,250 volunteers.

With funding secured from Warrington Borough Councils, allocation of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, we replaced our 15-year-old accessible caravan in North Wales, and we replaced over half of our fleet of mobility scooters and wheelchairs in our Shopmobility service.

Our social enterprise, the Disability Trading Company continues to grow in popularity, attracting interest from several new suppliers, being invited to influence the design of several independent living products, and passing the milestone of 500 Motability leases. In response to feedback about the cost-of-living crisis, we reopened our town centre Mobility and Independent Living store as an outlet for refurbished equipment under the banner of Loved B4 Mobility.

Our inclusive Santa's Grotto and Winter Wonderland in Walton Gardens attracted over 3,000 children, and with financial support from local businesses and individuals we distributed over 500 free tickets to disadvantaged children. Our Santa Dash attracted a record 230 Santa's.

Sadly, as we look ahead from April 2025, the future doesn't look as bright. With more organisations chasing ever decreasing funding opportunities, allocations are becoming a lottery and government decisions are leading to funding cuts across a wide range of services. Like hundreds of thousands of charities, we are facing higher employment costs due to changes to national insurance contributions and minimum wage increases, whilst our commissioners can't offer any uplifts to cover these costs.

Finally, we would like to thank everyone who shares and supports the WDP dream, especially our volunteers, our trustees, our staff, our supporters, our clients/customers and our partners.

WDP Services

Who we are and what we do

Warrington Disability Partnership (WDP) is an internationally acclaimed user-led charity. With over 30 years of experience in developing and delivering mobility and independent living services, we aim to support disabled people and those living with long-term health conditions. We are proud of our wideranging services, which include:

Promoting Independent Living

Visit our Centre for Independent Living (CIL) - located on Beaufort Street; the **Disabled Living Centre** at the Lifehouse on Brunswick Dock; and the Mobility and Independent Living Store (MILs) in Birchwood Shopping Centre. We offer showrooms full of the latest equipment from baths, showers and kitchens to beds, wheelchairs and stair lifts. Advice is available from our team of trained staff and volunteers, and a short-term hires service for various equipment.

The Energy Service Support Service provides help and support to households falling into fuel poverty. The fully qualified advisors will give 1-2-1 advice along with home visits and referrals to wider services. We also have a fully accessible "Energy Efficient Smart Flat" demonstrating the latest assistive technology solutions, based at the CIL. Our popular **Disability Helpline (01925 240064)** offers advice and support about local support groups and services, accessibility, transport, and more.

Our two **Shopmobility Schemes** in Legh Street Car Park and Birchwood Shopping Centre offer scooters and wheelchairs for use while shopping. They are available for hire to both members and day visitors, Monday to Saturday (9 am to 5 pm). A six-month membership costs just £10. The Scoota Safe campaign helps promote safe use of personal equipment, advice on maintenance and raises awareness of road safety.

The OWCH Pain Management and Beyond the Scars support group helps and supports local disabled people with self-management of Chronic Pain.

Our **Long Covid Support Group** meets every other Friday or online. The Service is available specifically for Warrington residents and those registered with Warrington practices. Access to workshops, groups and services is not possible without the inclusion of Warrington & Halton Long Covid Support Service via your GP.

Our Independent Living Team provides a support service for Warrington residents who use the Direct Payments scheme from Warrington Borough Council, assisting with all aspects of employing a Personal Assistant including assistance and advice regarding recruitment, DBS checks, pension schemes and contracts, with support from our inhouse payroll team.

Our Care and Support Advisor promotes Personal Health Budgets (PHBs) for individuals with complex health needs throughout Warrington and Halton. PHBs aim to allow greater choice, flexibility and control over how and when NHS-funded care is delivered. The Advisor works with the clients to produce individual Care and Support Plans, liaising with the NHS Cheshire & Merseyside concerning individual budget allocations.

The Disability Trading Company Limited

WDP's trading arm - Disability Trading Company (DTC), offers high-quality, independent living products at competitive prices. Running as a Social Enterprise, all profits are donated to WDP to support many of our unfunded services. For further details of services, please see page 6.

Employment & Training

Our Employment Team specialises in supporting local

disabled people, people living with long-term health conditions (including mental health), ESA claimants and those in receipt of incapacity-related benefits. The team support individuals through all stages of the employment process, job searching, CVs, application forms, preparing for interviews and when gaining employment. We also support people who are in work, as well as employers, by giving information about reasonable adjustments in the workplace including Access to Work Fund, the Disability Confident Scheme and the Mindful Employer.

Learning and Development

Visit the Marjorie Griffiths Learning Centre on Beaufort Street and take advantage of a whole host of courses designed to educate and inspire. Many courses are held in the Discover IT Suite and include 'Computers for the Terrified', vocational OCR qualifications and pre-employment IT. In addition, several other courses are available, which include flower arranging and creative writing.

We work closely with numerous local charities and voluntary organisations to provide a place for groups to meet and offer support to their members. Our well-equipped meeting and training rooms are also available to hire at a reasonable cost.

WDP delivers a variety of training, including Equality & Diversity, Disability Confident and Disability, and Sex Matters. Half-day training sessions are available to service providers, voluntary organisations and individuals to build knowledge and insight on these issues.

Accessible Holidays & Days Out

Our fully accessible holiday home in North Wales and our adapted, accessible narrowboat The Wizard are available for hire at competitive rates. With a range of options, they allow a bargain break or a day out on the water!

Opportunities to Socialise

We run two Luncheon Clubs for individuals looking for friendship, activities, fun and lunch! Our over 55's club meet every Wednesday from 10am to 2pm. As well as enjoying a two-course lunch and drinks, attendees also enjoy playing bingo, games, quizzes, chair-based exercises, and guest speakers. Our Monday Club caters to under 55's with a variety of social activities, including crafts, bingo and films. There is a £7.50 charge for the sessions and individuals are required to attend using their own transport.

Our Galleries Community Café offers a wide range of hot and cold meals, snacks and drinks in a warm and friendly atmosphere. The Café is open to members of the public and visitors to the Centre and Support Groups.

Listening and Advocacy

Get your voice heard locally by attending our monthly 'Staying Connected' meetings via Zoom, which provides a forum to exchange ideas and information about local services. Sessions are open to all who have been affected by long-term health conditions or disabilities, carers and representatives of support groups/organisations and statutory services.

We organise the Warrington's Appreciation of Efforts Awards, which provide an opportunity for disabled people and carers to nominate local employers, businesses, service providers or individuals who deserve recognition for promoting independence, delivering accessible or inclusive services or maintaining exemplary employment practices for disabled people and carers.

Development of Warrington Disability Partnership's Social Enterprise — The Disability Trading Company

In April 2011, Warrington Disability Partnership launched a social enterprise 'The Disability Trading Company'. Their first retail service was launched from the Warrington Centre for Independent Living, and in October 2011 they opened the Mobility & Independent Living Store (MILS) in the Golden Square Shopping Mall, followed by MILS Liverpool in early 2012.

In early 2013 DTC opened a large Mobility Workshop & Service Centre which provides servicing and repairs for individual customers, and businesses including Warrington and Halton Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, nursing homes and local Shopmobility Schemes. In late 2013 DTC launched a service aimed at recycling mobility equipment, scooters, wheelchairs and power-chairs.

Second-hand products are refurbished and recycled from our unit at Gateworth Industrial Estate. These can then be sold a low cost to local people. In partnership with other organisations, such as Care UK, products that are unable to be sold are donated to help disabled people in other countries. To-date, over £1 million worth of equipment has been donated to support disabled people across the world; including in Thailand, Egypt, Cameroon, Syria, Ukraine and Greece.

In 2017 DTC joined the British Health Trades Association, underlining their belief in the BHTA "Buy with Confidence" scheme that is accredited to Trading Standards. Receiving "approved dealer" accreditation to the national Motability Scheme was also achieved, which allows disabled people to use the enhanced mobility component of DLA or PIP to lease a powerchair or mobility scooter.

In 2018 DTC opened a new service, the Smart Flat is an assistive technology showroom located at the Warrington Centre for Independent living.

In 2019 in partnership with the Golden Square Shopping Centre, DTC moved their Mobility & Independent Living Store (MILS) from inside the Centre to a larger brighter store in Sankey Street.

In 2020 in partnership with Birchwood Shopping Centre, DTC opened a Mobility and Independent Living Store (MILS) in the Centre, it also includes Birchwood Shopmobility Service.

In 2022, DTC launched a new online shop designed so customers across the UK can purchase high-quality mobility & independent living products from the comfort of their homes. All our products can help increase your ability to live independently. We pride ourselves on a fast delivery service, and promise to pick up and send you your order before the end of the next working day. If you are unsure what products best fit your needs or have any questions, visit our website's contact us page.

What makes DTC unique?

- DTC has no private shareholders, 100% of its profits go to support WDP's charitable services which include subsidised Lunch Clubs for disabled people, an accessible narrowboat offering daytrips on the Bridgewater Canal and an accessible caravan in North Wales,
- DTC staff do not receive any incentive bonuses, which results in us providing advice versus high pressure selling,
- Free impartial home and work assessments based on the philosophy of information, advice and guidance, not just
- DTC is a user-led social enterprise; many staff and all volunteers have used their experience of living with a disability or long-term health condition to develop the services and ensure they sell the right products
- Nearly £2.5million has been saved by disabled people who have purchased mobility and independent living products from WDP's Mobility and Independent Living Stores (MILS) rather than from commercially driven businesses

Since working at WDP I have learnt a new outlook on life and how you shouldn't take anything for granted.



Disability Awareness Day 2024 (DAD33)

Grey skies and showers failed to dampen spirits as over 20,000 people visited the 33rd Disability Awareness Day at Walton Hall & Gardens.

Our flagship event, widely renowned as the world's largest voluntary led pan disability exhibition, was the culmination of a week-long of activities raising awareness about disability. Co-ordinated by Team WDP, with a huge team of volunteers, DAD is a pan-disability event which promotes a can do culture focusing on what disabled people can do throughout life and work.

The aim of this year's event was to promote independent living through the theme "It's what disabled people can do that matters". DAD 2024 exhibitors highlighted solutions supporting independent living and mobility, with equipment, products, transport, employment, education, training, health and social care, leisure activities, alongside over 100 charities/support groups. DAD provided a onestop-shop for information, advice and guidance relating to inclusion and independence.

Most of this year's Disability Awareness Day exhibitors were housed in a huge, tented village of marquees, supported by; an extended Sports Zone, a Main Arena, a huge Performing Arts Marquee, two further Arts Marquees for art and crafts (including regular workshops), a Silent







Disco, a children's fun fair and play areas.

With over 200 exhibitors, visitors could gain an insight into the help and support that is available locally, regionally and nationally from statutory organisations, businesses and voluntary sector groups, as well as trying new and adaptive activities including Tennis, American Football, Snooker, Rugby League, Martial Arts, Tai Chi, PowerChair Football, CrossFit and Scuba Diving in the on-site pool.

For those looking for a more relaxed day a fantastic lineup of talent could be found in the Arts Marquee with performances from some of the UK's leading disabled artists including Ella Together, Creating Adventures, BSL Choir, Stars Drama, Wolf Print Dance and Groovy Movers. BSL interpreters supported all acts.

Alternatively, sit alongside the Main Arena watching Guide Dog display team, Reach Sled Dogs Display Team, Batida Rio Samba Band, Royal Marines Corps of Drums and sports demonstrations.

Support services at DAD 2024 will include a free accessible Park and Ride service, free accessible buses from Warrington Town Centre, a free scooter and wheelchair loan service with trained enablers, British Sign Language interpreters, additional unisex wheelchair accessible toilets and over 100 trained stewards and helper's eager to make it a day to remember for everyone.

- Not only is the grotto fully wheelchair accessible, so too is the undercover winter wonderland scenery that is held in the indoor riding school at Walton Hall and Gardens, Warrington. Warrington Disability Partnership have over 20 years' experience of running a fully inclusive Santa's Grotto, which can be visited by all.
- WDP's Santa and some of our elves can communicate with deaf children and parents through British Sign Language.
- After listening to parents, WDP have included Quiet Hours, where the individual needs of children, parents and grandparents can be met, including Autism, Dementia and Alzheimer's.
- The Quiet Hour also caters for people who have sight loss, with trained sighted guides offering guided tours and interactive experience including touching, feeling and smelling a Christmas tree and other display items, within the sensory area.




WDP Financial Position 2023-24

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


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Cost-cutting council approves 4.98 % council tax rise

MEMBERS of the public and opposition councillors packed into Warrington Town Hall as the Borough Council's Cabinet backed its controversial cost-cutting budget with a 4.98% council tax

Councillors heard from Cllr Denis Matthews that the process of setting the authority's £208.045m budget had been "extremely challenging" due to rising costs and increased demand for services among the most vulnerable residents along with changes in interest rates and high inflation.

In his report he noted that setting the budget was "more difficult than in any year in recent memory.

The meeting was attended by members of the public and Liberal Democrat opposition councillors.

The Labour Cabinet members voted to increase council tax by 4.98% in the financial year 2025/6.

A resident in a Band D property will now pay £1,867.79 as a result of the proposed increase agreed

by Cabinet.
The following three financial years will see proposed council tax increases of 1.98% each year. Cllr Matthews explained that the

impact of Covid on services and pressures such as inflation being at its highest level for 40 years had impacted the authority.


As a result Warrington Borough Council is currently facing £18.039m overspend" in current financial year, he

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Double Cab Pick-Up Tax Changes – What to Know Before April 2025

Understanding the Tax Changes

From April 2025, doublecab pick-ups will no longer be classified as commercial vehicles, resulting in significant tax increases for some owners. With these changes on the horizon, it is crucial to determine how they may impact you before they take effect.

What Are the UK Pick-Up Truck Tax Changes?

From April next year, double-cab pick-up trucks will be classified as cars for tax purposes following the 2024 Autumn Budget.

A key impact of this change is on the benefit-in-kind (BiK) tax, which applies to goods and services provided to an employee at a reduced rate or for free. Currently, light commercial vehicles, including double-cab pick-ups with a carrying capacity of one tonne or more, are subject to a flat BiK tax rate of £3,960 annually for company drivers.

However, from April 2025, these vehicles will be taxed on a sliding scale based on their emissions, which could lead to significantly higher costs for company vehicle users. Given that most double-cab pick-ups have high-emission diesel engines, many drivers will face substantial tax increases.

Example of the New Tax Changes

The financial impact of this change depends on the vehicle owned. For instance, companyowned double-cab pick-ups that fall into the highest BiK bracket for company cars could see annual tax charges rise to as much as £15,000 – nearly three times the current flat rate for light commercial vehicles. This shift could prove challenging for tradespeople who rely on these vehicles for their work.

What to Do if You Own a Double-Cab Pick-Up

If you already own a doublecab pick-up, HMRC has introduced transitional BiK tax arrangements for businesses that have purchased or leased these vehicles before April 2025.

Businesses that have ordered, purchased, or leased a double-cab pick-up before this date will be able to continue using the previous tax treatment. However, this transitional arrangement will only remain valid until:

- The vehicle is disposed of
- The lease expires
- 5th April 2029 (whichever comes first)

This provides some flexibility for existing owners before and after

the new tax rules take effect.

Effects of the Tax Changes on Businesses

Beyond increased taxation, these changes could significantly impact industries reliant on double-cab pick-ups, such as construction and farming. Employers will not only see increased tax liabilities for employees using these vehicles but also higher National Insurance contributions due to the BiK tax increases.

As a result, many businesses may reconsider their vehicle fleets. Some may opt for traditional vans, which will continue to benefit from lower BiK rates, while others might transition to electric vehicles (EVs) to take advantage of lower tax rates associated with reduced emissions.

Key Dates to Remember

- 1st April 2025 Double-cab pick-ups will be classified as passenger cars for Corporation Tax purposes.
- 6th April 2025 For Income Tax purposes, double-cab pick-ups will be classified as cars for BiK and profit deductions.

Millions Face Fines for Late Tax Returns

Over a million taxpayers will face an automatic £100 fine for failing to file their tax returns by the 31 January deadline. Despite a slight drop in total filings compared to the previous year, HMRC received 11.5 million returns on time, with 97.4% submitted online.

Around 732,498 people filed on deadline day, with the busiest hour between 16:00 and 16:59. However, 9.5% of taxpayers missed the deadline, meaning HMRC could collect around £110m in penalties.

HMRC is urging late filers to submit their returns as soon as possible to avoid escalating penalties. After three months, daily £10 penalties apply, while after six and 12 months, further 5% or £300 charges are imposed. Late payments also attract additional fines and interest at 7.25%.
