



Local author releases Warrington-based anthology

CULCHETH-based author Chris Vobe has released an ambitious new anthology, combining free verse poetry, a brand new cycle of lyrics, a selection of short stories, and even photographs taken in some familiar Warrington locations.

The Ten People You Meet and Other Writings is steeped in the landscape of the author's North

landscape of the author's North West hometown, with both poetry and prose entries set against the backdrop of some notable Warrington landmarks.

Throughout the text, readers will find themselves transported to Sankey Valley Park, the Halliwell Jones Stadium, St Elphin's Church, Woolston Weir, and the Georgian scene-set Bewsey Street.

And eagle-eyed fans will also be able to spot some iconic locations in the village of Culcheth (a place Chris was determined not

to leave out!) which are depicted through several examples of artistic

photography.
Divided broadly into three sections, The Ten People You Meet is a delicately constructed, thought-provoking collection which offers a powerful and fresh exploration of familiar motifs. Through the eyes of its diverse cast of characters, themes such as love and loss are reexamined with a generous honesty, blending sorrowful reflections and candid narratives with the author's customary humour and endearing optimism. Each study is painted large across an original and

authentic canvas, upon which we find a carefully crafted series of still

Also included is The Gospel a unique, interconnected cycle of lyrics encompassing meditations on faith, distance, remorse and redemption – featuring Conversations with God, Ascension and the breath-taking Amor.

Incorporating poetry, prose, and a selection of Chris Vobe's own photographs, The Ten People You Meet defies the traditional conventions of, and seeks to redefine the nature of an anthology, delivering a commanding, immersive portrait of life, death and

our relationship with God.
Also featured are the short stories The Christmas Bauble, The Wolf and Fishing – a brand new tale set in Little Bassington featuring the characters Adam Chapman and Clarissa Clements from Chris Vobe's 2023 debut novel, The Water Tower.

Commenting on his latest book Chris said: "I'm really proud of The Ten People You Meet. It is an intricate tapestry of a work which talks about life, death, faith and love – all the subjects that really drive me as a writer But I wanted to drive me as a writer. But I wanted to set those conversations against the backdrop of my home town. The first section of the book is rooted in Warrington – we go walking through Sankey Valley Park in the rain; a man whose name we never learn makes a life changing decision outside the Halliwell Jones



Stadium; and we close a chapter of one couple's story on a bench overlooking Woolston Weir. I wanted to write something that

wasn't autobiographical, but was really reflective of the place I grew up, and the people who live here.

"The anthology is designed to resonate differently with different people. To that end, it can be whatever you want it to be. You can read it from cover to cover or just read it from cover to cover, or just dive in and take pot luck. However people choose to engage with it, I really hope they enjoy it, and find something fulfilling within."

Chris, a former local councillor, is already at work on his next novel, which he anticipates will be

released towards in early 2026.
He promises readers a "North West
novel" which tells a "dark story".

Alastair said: "Visitors to the park have commented on the improvements being made - with a recent survey highlighting what people enjoy about the park and what else they would like to see. This information will help us with our plans for the future as well as providing useful data for grant applications."



The Gardening Guide



Spring fertiliser can be applied to your lawn, but remember to water it in if there's no rain.

- Spring vegetables such as peas, beans and lettuce seeds can be sown now.
- Try spring cleaning your houseplants; remove spent flowers, dead leaves and rinse the dust from the leaves with a sprayer as clean leaves allow the plant to breathe!
- Plant up hanging baskets with fuchsias and other basket plants and then hang them up in your greenhouse to establish.
- Many of the birds (that you put up nest boxes for!) will have young now and need help with food.

MP responds to "bizarre" request for more details on CPS Centre closure

WARRINGTON North MP Charlotte Nichols has responded to a "bizarre" request for more details on the closure of the CPS centre at Culcheth.

Independent local Cllr. Neil Johnson challenged the Warrington North MP to give more details on follow-up actions for the CPS Centre following her recent Prime Minister's Question where she highlighted the plight of traders in the CPS Centre.

On Wednesday 12th February, Charlotte Nichols asked the Prime Minister Keir Starmer:

"Long standing traders in the CPS Centre in Culcheth were devastated to receive an eviction notice giving them just 28 days to vacate entirely out of the blue and on a spurious pretext by the new owner, shell company Shivat Haminim Capital. So far, the owner and legal representatives have failed to hear tenants' concerns and mine, and to negotiate a way forward. So, does the Prime Minister share my concerns at this situation and will he set out our plans to protect independent businesses which are at the heart of our high street and communities?"

Keir Starmer replied:"We do, Mr Speaker, expect landlords to make buildings are buildings safe and we support robust enforcement action from the regulator if they fail to do so. I will make sure that she gets a meeting with the minister to discuss what

steps can be taken in her particular case to support the business that

her constituents rely on."

Cllr. Johnson said:"Charlotte Nichols read out a question to the Prime Minister from her iPad over a month ago, to great fanfare by her supporters. This was being treated as a crucial intervention in the campaign to save the CPS Centre. However, since then, we have heard nothing more, either from the MP, the Minister she was due to meet, or in fact anyone in

the Labour Party.

"Simply asking a question to another MP, even if he is the Prime Minister, does not achieve What has happened anything.

"I am asking Charlotte Nichols to publicly provide more details on the outcome of her question. Residents of Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft

deserve clarity.

"Specifically, can she tell us:

1) Which Minister will you be meeting (or have you met) and when did/will the meeting take place?

2) What are you asking the Minister to do? What outcome do you hope to reach from the

meeting?

3) Has the Minister agreed to take any action in respect of the



CPS Centre or the landlords? If so, what action have they agreed to take and when will this happen?

4) Can a representative from the Save Our Shops campaign attend your meeting with the Minister, if it

has not already taken place?
"I believe these questions are fair, balanced, and reasonable. They can be summarised in two words: 'What now?'

look forward to Charlotte providing clear and unequivocal answers to these questions. If we are going to safeguard our shops, and protect our village identity, we must know what our MP and the Government are committed to

doing."
In response to his questions regarding the CPS Centre Ms Nichols said: "I find Cllr Johnson's assertion that "we have heard nothing more" frankly bizarre, not least because I remain in regular contact with affected businesses, but because among the meetings I have had since raising the issue at PMQs was with Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council where Cllr Johnson was actually present.

Since that meeting, I secured an extension to licenses and access to storage for affected businesses to allow them greater time for making arrangements. The landlord has stated that the evictions remain necessary for improvement works to the building, however, and a period of closure will be going ahead. There is not, politically, anything further that can be done to challenge this decision - it would require a successful legal challenge by the affected businesses through

the courts.
"I met with the Parliamentary (Housing, Local Under-Secretary and Communities Government), Alex Norris MP, and his departmental officials on 25 February. This was to discuss greater protection in legislation for small traders, independent businesses, and our high streets more generally, and where there are opportunities for this in upcoming legislation on planning and English devolution to stop a situation like this from being able to

happen again.

"Under the framework for High Street Rental Auctions, established in the Levelling Up and Regeneration Act 2023 and brought into force in December, local authorities have been given greater powers to take action where landlords have not taken sufficient steps to rent property - auctioning leases on premises that have been vacant for more than a year and granting local businesses and community groups the 'right to rent' empty commercial lots at market prices. We discussed how these existing powers could be used if the CPS Centre is left vacant, in order to ensure the building works are undertaken in a timely manner and the centre brought back into use as soon as possible for the community

Clothes became comfortable by the 20th century but women's perms were unsafe. In China foot-binding lasted into our own time. (Jackie pointed out that botox and sunbeds would have seemed stupid to our ancestors!)

MP visits Battle of Winwick site

Alongside the Battlefields Trust and the Battle of Winwick Society, Warrington North MP Charlotte Nichols recently visited the battle site to learn more about the history and future preservation of the site.

The Battle of Winwick was the final battle in the Second English Civil War. The forces of the English Parliament were led by Oliver Cromwell defeated a Scottish Army that had invaded England with the aim of putting Charles I back on his throne. The site of the battle is located in the fields just to the north of the village of Winwick.

Charlotte said: "Thank you to Paul and Richard from the Battlefields Trust and the Battle of Winwick Society for taking me out for a really interesting tour of the battlefield, to discuss how we can preserve this vital piece of our local history for future generations and give more people the opportunity to learn about it!

"We got absolutely soaked through but, as Richard pointed

out, it made the tour even more historically accurate as that was very much how the weather conditions had been when the battle

took place back in August 1648.' Paul Wright, North West Region Chair for the Battlefields Trust and Chair of the Battlefields Trust and Chair of the Battle of Winwick Society said: "We were delighted to have Charlotte come along to visit the battlefield with us. And mightily impressed that she was happy to brave the inclement weather. It demonstrated to us that she has a very real interest in this nationally important registered battlefield, a battlefield that really ought to be better known.

Alongside preserving the site for future generations to learn and enjoy, the Battlefields Trust and the Battle of Winwick Society working in

partnership with others, would like to add features for commemorative and educational purposes. These information boards include

All-weather sports pitch approved for former bowling green



PLANNING chiefs at Warrington have approved a retrospective application for an all-weather sports pitch on a former bowling green at Culcheth Sports Club – formalising the existing situation.

The bowling green at the club in Charnock Road had not been used

or about four years and the green was no longer fit for purpose.

Now the Sunflower Community Café and Connections Constituted Group have obtained permission

Group have obtained permission for the change of use.

A total of 42 letters and a petition were received by the borough council supporting the scheme – together with two letters of objection relating to possible noise and floodlight concerns.

The 3G all-weather pitch includes tagging seating car parking and a

fencing, seating, car parking and a children's play area.

Planners were told the Sunflower Community Café provided an income for Culcheth Sports Club and a service to the community – including the Ukrainian Family Hub, which catered for Ukrainian

people from all over the borough. The site was now operated by a community hub used by local people and by refugees from the war in Ukraine. The proposals sought to retain the 3G all-weather sports pitch, an area of, hardstanding, fencing, associated seating area and children's play area, to enable the community hub continue operating. Without this to continue operating. Without this scheme, the community hub would be forced to close.

The site employed 10 members of staff and many more volunteers.

Officers said the proposal demonstrates that the community benefits resulting from the existing facilities outweighed the loss of the former bowling green, which was no longer in use by the local community and was no longer

Century old shop can be converted into modern offices

PLANS to convert a century-old shop into a modern office building in a prominent part of Culcheth village centre have been given the go-ahead by Warrington planning chiefs.

The development junction of Warrington Road and Church Lane was opposed by two nearby residents who feared contemporary-style zinc cladding might deteriorate over time and would be out of character with the area.

But three other neighbours supported the scheme, welcoming a new use for a dilapidated vacant shop last used for the sale and repair of E-bikes and E-scooters.

Warrington Borough Council planning officers said the zinc cladding would revitalise and enhance a rather dilapidated older building.

Two previous applications to change the shop to offices, in 1978 and 1980 were refused.

Culcheth and Glazebury Parish Council did not oppose the scheme.

The ground floor will have open plan offices, with a toilet and kitchenette at the rear and there would be offices upstairs.

The zinc cladding will be on the front of the building and the roof.


