

Call for action to tackle anti-social hot spot

tackle what he calls an "anti-social behaviour hot spot" Shaw Street, Culcheth.

Cllr.Johnson says that the Shaw Street Recreation Ground and nearby playing fields have become a magnet for incidents of anti-social behaviour, including graffiti, vandalism, drug dealing and use of alcohol.

Now, Cllr Johnson is speaking out on behalf of residents in the Shaw Street and Warrington Road area who have been forced to put up with this behaviour for too long.

"Enough is enough. He said:

These disgraceful acts of anti-social behaviour have gone on for too long. We know that a small group of anti-social youths congregate in this area on Friday and Saturday nights, drinking, graffitiing the facilities, and even engaging in vandalism.

"There is no reason why the good people of Shaw Street and Warrington Road should have to put up with this.
"We know that the village litter-

picking team, who I work closely with, have collected dozens of nitrous oxide canisters from around this site. A small, badly-behaved minority are making life difficult for everyone.

"I am disappointed that, when this issue has been raised in the past, certain Councillors have shrugged their shoulders and said that nothing can be done. That is not good enough and it's not the right attitude to take.

"I want to convene the police, the Council and the users of the playing fields to discuss what can be done. There has been talk about closing the gates at night to stop people getting access. This has been challenged on health and safety grounds, but it must be possible to arrive at a solution. Antisocial behaviour is not acceptable and we should not make excuses against tackling it on 'health and safety grounds'. I will be inviting the police, the Council and other services to a meeting in the near future to hold serious discussions about this problem and the effect it is having on the village. As the independent voice of the people, I want to convene all parties and

iron this out.
"I also want to see a stronger police presence in the area."

Cllr Johnson said: "As people

know, housing is a passion of mine. Making sure that everyone in Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft has a safe, secure and comfortable place to live is really

important. I have been pleased to help tenants of Torus Housing with these longstanding problems, which are thankfully now resolved.
I will always hold local housing providers to account if they do not



AS the final traders left the CPS Centre at Culcheth the popular Sundial Terrace Café was celebrating a new lease of life which has been welcomed by local Independent Cllr. Neil Johnson.

Borough and Parish Cllr. Johnson, who has been campaigning on behalf of traders since the shock closure news, has expressed his delight that the Sundial Terrace cafe, previously located in the CPS Centre, will be given a new lease of life at the Daten Sports and Social Club.

The café was forced to vacate the premises following the decision by the CPS Centre landlords to evict their tenants earlier this year.

Cllr. Johnson said: "I am delighted, both for the Sundial Terrace café and the other businesses formerly of the CPS Centre, who have managed to find new premises throughout the

"Our community is a thriving hub of local employment. I was determined to do everything possible to help these tenants, not

only with their storage and notice periods, but with securing new rental space for their businesses.

"I am delighted that the Sundial Terrace café, a very popular place to eat and enjoy freshly cooked meals by the brilliant team who work there, has found a new home at the Daten. I encourage all residents to support our local eateries whenever they can, whether that be restaurants, cafes or pubs. As long as we spend locally, the people who work there can be assured of secure jobs with good wages. It makes sense to help our village economy and support one another.
"I will be arranging to hold a

councillor's drop-in surgery at the Sundial Terrace café in the future so that residents can come and speak with me, face to face, over a cup of tea."

support Victoria and her husband in their new endeavour, having had to move out of their previous store at the CPS shopping centre when the owners there decided to evict all the businesses upstairs.

Council remains committed to securing Gypsy & Traveller site despite claims £25k wasted at Croft

WARRINGTON Borough Council says it remains committed to securing a safe and adequate transit site to support the Gypsy & Traveller community, despite claims £25,000 was wasted on a location at Croft.

Independent Councillor Neil Johnson, who controversially leaked the location of a proposed transit site off Kenyon Lane in the village, has slammed the council after receiving a breakdown of the nearly £25,000 spending they made on their plans to site a gypsy/traveller transit site in Croft.

Cllr. Johnson resigned from the Labour Group last year in protest at their plans and revealed the planned location of the site on Kenyon Lane. At the time, it was revealed that £25,000 of public funds had been spent on the project, which had to be abandoned, but without any further detail available on exactly what the money had been spent on.

Cllr. Johnson has pursued the Council for this information for nearly six months and has now received a breakdown of the

associated costs.

He said: "It has taken nearly six months for the Council to come clean, but finally this information has been dragged kicking and

screaming into the public domain.
"The bottom line is this: they

wasted nearly £25,000 in rate payers money, pursuing a gypsy/traveller site which was never going to happen. The Council did not have access rights to the land or any sort of accommodation with the landowner. Nevertheless, they decided to proceed, and the hapless members of the Cabinet voted to carry on without having carried out due diligence on this disastrous scheme.

"They poured money down the drain. Nearly £4,000 on a valuation report, over £6,000 on legal costs, and a further £4,000 on agents fees. Officer costs were in excess of £7,000, and external partners spent over £1,200. This was all redundant because it was never going to happen. Even without the access issues, it was a totally unsuitable site.

totally unsuitable site.

"I am outraged that money paid through taxes by my residents has been squandered in this way. Think what could have been done in Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft with that £25,000 if it hadn't been wasted. Someone's head should roll for this.



"The Council's auditors should act immediately and conduct a forensic investigation into this wasted money. How can officers and Labour councillors have approved so much expenditure on a scheme that was doomed to failure? Why was due diligence not carried out regarding access to the site? Why did no Councillors ask that question? Something has gone seriously wrong if money is allowed to be thrown away like this. I call upon my fellow ward councillors Matt Smith and Janet Seddon, to join me in pressing for a review by the external auditors. The local MP, Charlotte Nichols, should also refer this matter to the Secretary of State for Local Government.

"Frankly, those who wasted public funds should have to pay the money back from their own pockets. Why should we foot the bill?"

But a Warrington Borough Council spokesperson responded saying: "We produced the comprehensive information requested by Councillor Johnson months ago. The assertion that we delayed communicating this information is wholly inaccurate.

"The cost incurred resulted from the extensive due diligence that was required for this potential site. The council invests a considerable amount of money each year managing unlawful occupation of council-owned land and we remain committed to securing a safe and adequate site to support the Gypsy & Traveller Community."



Keeping bees – and how to attract them to your garden

LOCAL apiarist Stephen Nichols gave an interesting talk on "Keeping Bees" at the monthly meeting of Croft WUI.

He has been a beekeeper for 13 ears, beginning when his son gave him a hive during a house clearance. He described his role as managing the bees so that they thrive and produce new colonies.

Members were shown an unoccupied hive Stephen brought some jars of his locally produced

A typical hive contains one queen bee and about 60,000 honeybees, only 6000 of which will be male drones. The rest are female worker bees who collect food, feed the developing larvae and build wax honeycombs where eggs are laid and honey is stored. The drones main role is to mate with the queen bee, after which they fall to the ground

The queen is kept in the base layer of the hive where she lays up to 2000 eggs a day.

A queen excluder grid stops the queen from leaving the base layer so that if the bees swarm they will return

to the hive, attracted by her scent. Honey is stored in honeycombs on frames in the upper layers of the hive.

Stephen described how he breaks the wax sealing the honeycombs with a fork before centrifuging and triple filtering to collect the pure honey. Conserving the bee population is of vital importance because 80

per cent of the food we eat relies on pollinators during its production. Plants that will attract bees to the garden include fruit trees, hawthorn, mahonia, honeysuckle, foxgloves and rhododendrons.

A worrying threat to bees is the Asian hornet, a voracious predator Asian horner, a voracious predator now spreading to Britain, which can destroy a whole hive in a day. Members of the public can report sightings by sending a photo to alertnonnative@ceh.ac.uk
