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Editor's Comment

THE findings of the Government's Best Value Inspection into the financial affairs of Warrington Borough Council came as no surprise for many, with debts of around £1.8 billion.

While it is pleasing to see the council's leadership team have accepted the "serious findings" of the Best Value Inspection and promise "decisive action" one word has been missing from the council's has been missing from the council's response - and that word is "sorry."

So far no apology has been issued to those who challenged and questioned the level of council debt

and some of the high-risk investments.
In fact some of those who raised concerns, were often left to be made

to feel like fools, so it is not surprising they are now asking for heads to roll.

One of those who often challenged the council's financial position and investments was former Warrington South MP Andy Carter, who is indeed one of those making





such calls.

While Labour leader Cllr. Hans Mundry is saying decisive action is required and has already been working to reduce debt, he was also part of the Cabinet involved in making and approving these financial decisions.

His predecessor and deputy have long left the building and one has to wonder if they knew what was coming?

Accepting the recommendations of the Government inspectors, Cllr Mundry says it contains important challenges and since taking over leadership of the council, "clear and deliberate steps have been taken to change its direction" change its direction.

The Best Value Inspection findings include concerns relating to governance, leadership, organisational culture, financial management, and commercial

investment activity.

Government envoys will now oversee the ongoing work to try and balance the books but what we don't want is a knee jerk reaction with some of the investments which give a good return on investment - most notably Birchwood Park.

A marketing exercise is currently underway to evaluate the possible future sale of the business park - in my opinion while it would obviously some much-needed revenue, the ongoing revenues it



generates would be much better in the long-term, as the value and returns are only going to go in one direction.


Meanwhile, it would be refreshing if someone from the corridors of power could issue a much-needed apology to the people of Warrington for this financial mess, while also looking how to improve revenues from existing assets without making drastic cuts.

Finally on a more positive note congratulations to everyone involved at St Rocco's Hospice on their 40th anniversary milestone.

I remember reporting on the hospice being built as a young reporter and have seen how it has developed and evolved over the years. It has not always been an easy journey with plenty of ups and downs over the years.

But the hospice has stood the test of time and is a vitally important part of our local community and deserves all the support it can get during this milestone year.





Marketing exercise for "possible disposal" of Birchwood Park

TOWN Hall chiefs at Warrington have approved a proposal to fund a marketing exercise for Birchwood Park to consider offers for a possible disposal.

Members of the borough council's cabinet approved the proposal after receiving a report from Cllr Denis Matthews, cabinet member for finance, assets and investments.

But it was stressed that it was not a proposal to sell Birchwood Park at this stage.

Any disposal of the property would be subject to a further cabinet report, following a marketing exercise

marketing exercise.
Disposal of the property, if considered, would be for economic regeneration, growth, debt reduction and financial capital receipt purposes.

The reason for the decision was said to be because it is recommended to progress the proposal as it is considered best value for the council and in the best financial interests of the council.

The 49-hectare business park is one of the biggest employment areas in the North West and is home to a number of high profile companies including Rolls Royce SMR, Amentum, Cavendish Nuclear, Vesta Wind Technology, Mirion Technologies, Nuvia and

the Government's National Nuclear appliance

Laboratories.
Sellafield Ltd have their

headquarters adjacent to the park.
Among other occupiers of
Birchwood Park are household
appliance manufacturer Hoover
Candy, Haier, IT management
solutions company Flexera

Software and new online retailers and distribution centres ArneClo and Manière de Voir.

More than 165 companies occupy the park, employing more than 6,000 people.

Divorce - Some Common Mistakes

Divorce is widely recognised as highly stressful and emotionally challenging. Here are a few of the most common mistakes to avoid:

- 1. Failing to seek early legal advice: Divorce is typically a multifaceted process often also encompassing separating finances and making child arrangements. There is much to consider and delaying seeking legal advice from an experienced divorce lawyer can lead to missed opportunities, misunderstandings, critical errors and substantial prejudice to your position.
- 2. Taking legal advice from friends and family: This is worse than number 1 above. You may have friends or family who think they know it all, but they really don't. Even if they have been through divorce themselves their situation wasn't identical to yours. Each case is unique and must be decided on its own facts. Get your emotional support and a sympathetic ear from friends and family if you like but do yourself a favour and get your legal advice from a divorce lawyer only.
- 3. Letting emotions drive decisions: It is normal and natural for a whole range of emotions to come into play in divorce but emotions can cloud sound judgement, which can lead to making poor decisions which can lead to suffering poor outcomes. It's important to stay focussed throughout.
- 4. **Underestimating financial disclosure:** Both parties are obliged to provide disclosure of their financial circumstances. Some people say they would be willing to waive their entitlement to see the full ins and outs' of the other parties' finances but this can be a huge mistake. 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Hundreds rally to save library

HUNDREDS of people have rallied to campaign against the controversial plan to close Westbrook Library as a nine-year-old schoolboy challenged Warrington Borough Council over their proposal.

A "Friends" group has been formed – and more than 40 people put their names forward at its launch meeting as volunteers to keep the library open.

Since then, more have come forward with offers to "do whatever it takes" to save the library.

Warrington Borough Council says the library does not perform as well as others across the borough but residents believe the library is under threat because the building is leased rather than being owned by the council.

Hundreds of people turned up for the latest consultation meeting at the library. Many children attended, coming straight from school armed with posters bearing messages such as "Where will I get my stories from?" and "Save the library – don't gamble with my future."

Previously a nine-year-old schoolboy turned up at Full Council to challenge Warrington Borough Council over the proposed closure of the library

Ardern Mansfield, who was supported by other pupils from St Philip Primary School at the meeting, read out an impassioned plea asking the council what pupils, family and friends would do for

their "mental health and wellbeing, connect with others, read books, learn, develop a love of reading, relax, attend activities, complete their homework and choose books that they can take home — all for free – if Westbrook library closes?"

Due to the overwhelming amount of response to the Consultation it will take until mid-June to collate and review all proposals and opinions, at which point the Council will be able to announce

The event was hosted by Golden Square in partnership with HC Promotions.



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


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Celebrating 40 years of Hospice care

It was suggested by a local GP that there was a need for hospice care in Warrington to support those in the community with a palliative diagnosis. Plans to develop 'St. Rocco's Hospice' at St. Anne's Vicarage, Orford began.

For the last **40 years**, St. Rocco's Hospice has been provding essential, personalised care to those in the community free of charge, to help make every day count for those diagnosed with a life limiting illness.

Volunteers enabled us to open the first fully owned St. Rocco's Hospice shop on Battersby Lane in 1987. We now have 7 shops and a successful eBay online store operating across Warrington to support our community.



St. Rocco who was the patron saint of infectious diseases devoted his time to **helping and caring for others**. It was therefore a fitting tribute to his legacy of helping those in need to name the hospice 'St. Rocco's Hospice'.

In 1992 our Board of Trustees identified that a fit for purpose building was required as the demand for end of life care grew in the community. This would form the 10 bed Inpatient Unit and Vitality Centre that you see here today.

Located in **Bewsey**, we support people over the age of 18 with any type of life limiting illness along with their families and loved ones through the range of inpatient and outreach facilities and services. Our inpatient unit features **modern facilities** for patients requiring 24 hour care and our medical outreach clinics are **led by our palliative care consulant and supported by our clinical team** who focus on complex symptom control and improving quality of life.

We celebrated our 10th anniversary with the launch of an appeal for a new purpose-built building at Lockton Lane, Bewsey. The building officially opened in 1999 with a 10 bed inpatient unit

In 2001, St. Rocco's saw an influx in volunteers kindly looking to gift their time. In 2013 we received a Volunteering Pledge from Warrington Voluntary Action with a futher pledge recieved in 2023. We rely on the generosity of our volunteers to support us at the hospice in many ways, supporting our patients, at our shops and at events and currently have 626 registered volunteers who support us.

We rely heavily on the generosity of our community through fundraising activities to help generate the £5million+ needed to run the hospice each year. Our first, largest participation event the Starlight Walk took place in 2006 with 1,200 women taking part. Whether its a personal challenge or community event theres something for everyone to take part in fundraising for your local hospice.

Warrington Integrated Palliative Care Hub is based at the hospice, and is a single point of referral for Palliative and End of Life Care Services across Warrington. Our outreach services allow us to support patients and their loved ones through counselling and emotional care, physiotherapy, relaxation and complimentary therapies and support for carers.



Our Palliative Virtual Ward successfully extended its initial 12 month pilot after receiving further funding in 2023. This allowed the use of further technology to expand the care St. Rocco's provides, giving patients more Independence by allowing them to receive care in their own homes.





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Spotlight on Local History with James Balme

In search of **Edward the Elder**



It was in the year 923 AD, deep in the mists of time when a fortified village was founded close to the borders of Lymm. So important was this settlement that it even got a mention in the Anglo-Saxon Chronicles. The Chronicles stated 'AD 923 King Edward went with an army late in the harvest and ordered that the village be inhabited and fortified'.

Having read this many times historical village has to be the 16th century timber framed building

put some meat on the bones and go and take a look for myself, after all I love the challenge of investigating such stories and trying to add some

substance to them.

Armed with my video camera it was time to set out on my latest quest to search out evidence behind this story for myself. As I wound slowly down the country lanes towards Thelwall I couldn't help but notice how tranquil the area was and my imagination began to wander filling my mind with images of Saxon soldiers who would have once roamed the area jealously guarding the now fortified village under the command of King

But what do we know of King Edward during the turbulent times of the tenth century? Edward was the son of Alfred the Great and he became King the Great and he became King of the Anglo Saxons between the years 899 until his death on the 17th July 924. In the year 910 his armies inflicted a decisive defeat on an invading Viking army ending for good the threat from the North. With this knowledge now firmly in my head I arrived at the quaint and unassuming village of Thelwall located close to the banks Thelwall located close to the banks of the Manchester ship canal and It wasn't long before it became clear that the history books did indeed reflect what is clearly an ancient village complete with a picture postcard Post Office and chocolate box cottages.

But the Jewel in the crown of this

historical village has to be the 16th century timber framed building known today as the Pickering Arms, for it is this building that gives us the biggest clue for the history of the village. Upon the outside timbers it states 'In the year 923 King Edward the Elder founded a city here and called it Thelwall'. During the time of Edward a Burh was built at Thelwall in the year 919 to guard an important strategic crossing point of the river Mersey. Whilst the exact location of this crossing point is heavily disputed today there is no doubt that it existed. However with the Mersey shifting its course over the centuries since the crossing was constructed its highly likely to have been eroded and washed away over time thus removing any evidence of its exact position in the landscape.

Also in Thelwall stands All Saints church. This was an ancient place of worship first built in 1663 by Richard Brook but was rebuilt in 1843 with the costs being met by William Nicholson of nearby Thelwall Hall. A chancel was added Thelwall Hall. A chancel was added to the church during the 1890s. An interesting feature of the church is the stained glass windows being dedicated to the Rylands family amongst other notable families in the area. Why not take a trip out to Thelwall and see the history of this picturesque village.

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Property Investment: Should you own personally or through a company?

When it comes to property investment, choosing how to structure ownership is a key strategic decision. While some opt to invest directly as individuals or through partnerships, others prefer the flexibility and protection offered by limited companies. The structure you choose can have far-reaching implications for tax, succession planning, legal liability, and financing.

Although many recent tax changes have focused on residential property, particularly the restriction on mortgage interest relief, commercial property investors have also seen notable changes—such as the expansion of UK capital gains tax to non-resident landlords. Whether you invest personally or through a company, understanding the nuances of each option is essential.

Legal and Practical Distinctions

A limited company is a separate legal entity, meaning it can own property, enter contracts, and continue trading independently of its shareholders or directors. This brings limited liability—protecting personal assets if the business runs into difficulties. In contrast, individuals and traditional partnerships carry the risk of unlimited liability, where even personal property (such as a home) could be at risk in the event of financial trouble.

Despite this protection, lenders often require personal guarantees from directors when financing company-held properties. Buy-to-let mortgages for limited companies also tend to carry higher interest rates—usually 0.5% to 1% more than those for individual borrowers—and may involve more rigorous lending criteria.

Limited companies also offer advantages in continuity and flexibility. They don't cease upon a shareholder's death, and different share classes allow tailored control, income distribution, and succession planning.

Tax and Family Structuring Benefits

One of the key reasons property investors incorporate is tax efficiency. Unlike individuals—who face restrictions on deducting mortgage interest from rental income—limited companies can fully deduct all interest and finance costs. In addition, rental profits in a company are subject to corporation tax, which is lower than higher rates of personal income tax:

- 19% for profits up to £50,000
- 25% for profits over £250,000
- Marginal relief applies in between

Family Investment Companies (FICs) take this further, offering

a structure that allows parents to retain control of assets while gradually passing wealth to children. By using alphabet shares, families can control dividend distributions and voting rights with precision. Shares in the company—not fractional ownership in physical property—are passed on, potentially outside the parents' estate for inheritance tax purposes, provided the sevenyear gift rule is met.

Funding a company or FIC can be done through cash injections, director loans, or transferring properties with no accrued gains. Where directors have lent the company money, those funds can later be withdrawn tax-free. If the capital is sourced from a trading company, care must be taken not to jeopardise the trading status of the lending business.

Partnership and LLP Considerations

Traditional partnerships still hold appeal, particularly for family or spousal arrangements. They allow profits to be allocated in flexible ratios—ideal for tax planning where individuals are in different tax bands. Partnerships can also qualify for certain reliefs on asset disposal that aren't available to companies, such as business asset disposal relief or incorporation relief.

However, stamp duty land tax may apply when forming

or restructuring a partnership, even if it's part of an eventual incorporation plan. For inheritance tax purposes, if an asset is personally owned but used by a partnership, only 50% business property relief is typically available. Full 100% relief may apply if the property is owned directly by the partnership.

Limited Liability Partnerships (LLPs) are a hybrid of companies and partnerships, offering a separate legal identity and limited liability, but profits are taxed personally on the members. Each partner is liable to income tax on their share of profits—whether withdrawn or not—at their marginal rate, potentially up to 45%. National Insurance contributions may also apply. Nonetheless, LLPs are favoured for their flexibility and protection, and they allow profit allocation to be optimised for tax purposes.

Final Thoughts

There is no one-size-fits-all approach to property ownership. Company structures may offer tax efficiency, liability protection, and succession planning advantages, while partnerships allow greater flexibility in income allocation and access to reliefs. The right choice depends on your goals, income levels, family dynamics, and long-term plans.
