High school launches 'Hall Together' now

Lymm High School is 'very excited' to introduce its Hall Together raffle to the Lymm community.

Launched last month to parents, carers and staff, the school now hopes that the online raffle will be shared far and wide to further raise funds for its Hall transformation project, termed 'Hall Together'. With the increase in building costs, and the decrease in

Government capital funding, Lymm High made the difficult decision to cancel the proposed Performing Arts Centre it had hoped to build on site. Plan B is a standalone drama studio and the refurbishment of its current Main Hall.

The drama studio was completed over the summer holidays.' The 100m2 performance space is a new building based at the rear of the existing Performing Arts block on the school site.

The modernisation of the Hall will occur over a year in phases, dependent largely upon how much is generated from fundraising efforts and school resources.

Stage 1 of the transformation has included a redesigned stage area, floor renovation, painting, new curtains, updated artwork and a new trophy cabinet. As can be seen in the photo, the Main Hall now has a much more modern and fresher look to it.

Stage 2 of the Hall Together project will hopefully encompass

replacement seating, sound access improvements, and professional theatre lights and a rig.

"Our Hall Together raffle is a fun and easy way to raise funds towards upgrading the theatre lights and sound system of our Main Hall", explains the raffle organiser, Simon Marsden, Lymm High's Chief Operating Officer. "Last term, in collaboration with our PTA, we raised more than £60K towards the project; and over the summer holidays, we progressed with a range of improvements that are now being enjoyed by the whole school."

Online raffle tickets can be bought for £2 each, and people can buy as many as they like. Anyone over the age of 18 can take part, and they don't need to be linked to Lymm High School, or indeed Lymm.

Lymm foster carer scoops national award

A LYMM woman has scooped a national award, recognising her inspirational work as a foster carer over the last 14 years, utterly transforming the lives of foster children.

Janet Linley is a foster carer with Foster with CANW, a not-for-profit independent fostering agency, part of the charity Child Action Northwest (CANW).

She was awarded the prestigious Unsung Hero of the Year Award at the Third Sector Awards, after

being nominated by colleagues.
Working 24/7, Janet has
transformed the lives of her foster children. These include Katlyn, who rirst came to live with her, aged nine, with hugely complex medical and social needs, alongside very limited communication skills. Janet learned a vast array of medical skills to enable her to provide all the care Katlyn has required. She advocated for Katlyn when it came to providing support outside the home, and making sure her needs are met at all times. This included sitting with her in school for months until an appropriate Teaching Assistant could be provided, taking and collecting her from college

when suitable transport could not be provided, and much more.

Janet has supported Katlyn through big life changes from through big life changes from childhood to adult life. Katlyn's health and social development improved in leaps and bounds, thanks to Janet's care. She went from being bed-bound to now walking. She has learned Makaton in order to communicate. Her tracheotomy has been removed and she can breathe independently. With support from Janet, she joined Brownies and Guides and now, as a young adult, enjoys social activities with her peers.

Ian Charnock, Fostering service lead at Foster with CANW,

lead at Foster with CANW, who nominated Janet for the award, said "Janet's dedication and support she provides to her foster children is absolutely extraordinary, particularly in the light of personal losses she has suffered. She is a selfless caregiver, who is passionate about

supporting other foster carers. She takes additional time to provide guidance and support to new foster carers and attends support events to help provide other carers with a good support network.

"Janet is an absolute inspiration everyone involved in fostering children. We offer her our heartfelt thanks for everything she does and warmest congratulations on

receiving this wonderful award.".

Set against the lush backdrop of the picturesque village of Lymm, de Larz's novel offers more than meets



happened on Tuesday, 23rd September, between the hours of 6 pm and 8 am the following morning.

"If you think you may have witnessed anything suspicious, please can you report it to the police via 101."

Packed public meeting to discuss better bus services for Lymm

RESIDENTS packed into a public meeting at Lymm Village Hall to discuss ways in which public transport bus services could be improved.

This was a follow-up meeting held earlier in the year and was organised by local Liberal Democrat Councillors Graham Gowland and lan Marks and attended by transport officers from Warrington Council and Transport for Greater Manchester

for Greater Manchester.

Cllr Gowland said: "The Hall was packed and we were very pleased with the questions raised and the suggestions put forward by bus users. The first part of the meeting was to do with connectivity between Lymm and South Warrington and Altrincham and Manchester. An improved service was introduced on 1 September. Changes were made to the hourly service from Warrington to Sale, which is now renumbered as Service 5A and runs from Warrington via Latchford to Sale Metrolink. It replaces the old Service 5 through Partington and provides connections to Bee Network buses and trams. The new Service 5 reintroduces an hourly service via Broomedge and Little Bollington to Altrincham, offering a faster direct service from Warrington, Stockton Heath and Lymm. A new hourly service, the 280, run by the Bee Network, will run between Altrincham and Lymm via Dunham and Warburton.

"Residents raised several issues about these changes. There was concern about the unreliability of some buses which did not inspire confidence with users. Updated timetables were needed and timings should be tweaked because sometimes buses arrived too close to each other or just miss connections. A Sunday service would be welcome to make it easier for families to visit places like Dunham Massey. If the 280 service could be extended to cover the centre of Lymm, this would be very helpful. The officers said more digital displays were planned and that they would go away and see what other improvements could be made."

Cllr Ian Marks added: "The original bus service through the Statham part of Lymm was withdrawn in 2022 when buses were no longer allowed to go under the Barsbank Aqueduct. After a 600-name petition was submitted to the Council, a revamped 47 service was introduced in 2023. Sadly, it was withdrawn this September along with several other services in Warrington that were not paying their way due to low patronage. Getting to bus stops on the A56 is too dangerous, if not impossible,

for disabled and older people because of the narrow pavement under the Barsbank Aqueduct. The lack of transport to Lymm village centre was always a problem with the 47 service. "I am pleased that the officers from

"I am pleased that the officers from Warrington agree that alternative options are needed for Statham residents and also for places like Weaste Lane in Thelwall. One immediate fix is to revise the times of the Lymm Shopper service and hopefully expand it from three days a week to five. This will provide a figure of eight service around the

village, taking in the centre, and will be named the 'lymm Loop'. Officers are talking to Warrington Community Transport about using the Dial-a-ride service for journeys. This is a great idea but it is essential we promote this service by getting information about what is on offer to residents. Thirdly, there are successful schemes in other parts of the country based on car pools and car sharing. We can look at these schemes, but we do need people to come forward to help with coordination, so I welcome any offers."

governors at Primary for many years. He has been assistant chaptain at Chester University and a member of Warrington SACRE. He was also chaplain to the local ATC and from 2002 was diocesan chaplain to the Mothers' Union. In 2010, Fr Michael was made an Honorary Canon of Chester Cathedral.

Fr Michael soon became active in community life, taking part in Dickensian Day, May Queen and "Carols at the Cross" where he led the singing for many years. He was involved with the Lymm Festival from its inception, serving on the committee, giving talks, organising and taking part in concerts and poetry readings. He has steadfastly supported the ecumenical work of Churches Together in Lymm. Many will remember Fr Michael

as an accomplished musician and organist who loves singing!

New team taking over Poppy Appeal

Boxes of poppies will soon by back in village shops, bars, hotels, restaurants, churches, schools and supermarkets

Thanks to the parish council, big red poppies will also be back on local lamp posts.

Mr Meldrum said: "Remembrance time is a very special time of year. It's a time when we unite across faiths, cultures and background to remember those who have served and are serving their country in the armed forces and those who sadly never returned home to their families

"We pray for a peaceful world, but there are still so many conflicts raging around the world.

In 2025, we're asking you once again to wear your Poppy with pride. The Poppy remains the symbol of Remembrance. All those years ago in Flanders field the red Poppies grew, a reminder of the horrors that had gone before but also a symbol of Remembrance, Respect and Hope for

Last year Royal British Legion welfare teams supported 40,000 cases in a variety of ways. Twenty five per cent of grants went towards providing essentials such as food and clothing to ensure the Armed Forces community never had to go hungry or cold. The Admiral Nurses assisted over 1,000 new families living with dementia. More than 10 per cent of grants went into improving independence through mobility equipment and adaptations which helped to support disabled veterans and family members to live their lives to the fullest. The RBL Care Homes provided support for more than 800 people last year, either as residents or attending for day care. In addition, the RBL supported the work

of several rehabilitation centres as well as The Battle Back Centre where £3000 could provide a veteran with the support they need to regain their independence via a multi-activity recovery course. Those funds raised by the Poppy Appeal also enabled our brave men and women to train and take part in the Invictus Games. The range of support that the Poppy Appeal finances is great and far

Plan for warehouses in green belt on former nursery site rejected by planners

PLANS to build four new warehouses on a former nursery site on green belt at Lymm have been thrown out by town planners.

The proposal involved the erection of four new warehouses/ storage buildings at the former Broomedge Nurseries Site, on Burford Lane, Broomedge, Lymm.

The application relates to an irregularly shaped site comprising approximately 24116m² (2.41ha) of land situated in the Green Belt

to the eastern side of Burford Lane in the Broomedge area of Warrington. The site lies outside the Green Belt settlement village of Broomedge and was formerly in use as a commercial horticultural Nursery and contains a number of greenhouses which have fallen into disrepair, a number

of workshops plus a steel-framed part-brick building located towards the centre of the site plus areas of hardstanding.

The north part of the site appears to be degraded and is overgrown with rubble mounds towards the

northern boundary.
It was proposed to replace three existing Greenhouses with single-storey buildings. Each building would be circa 50m² and would have a pitched roof to a maximum height of 5m. The applicant proposes to rent commercial storage space in each of the

buildings.

Planners say that once the current building is demolished, which needs to happen to make way for the proposed buildings, there would be no building and therefore the proposed buildings could not be said to be within the curtilage of a building; Furthermore, there is no permission in place to demolish the existing buildings and it has not been demonstrated that such permission is not required.

In support of the application, was stated that Broomedge Nurseries was established around 1936/37 for the purpose of growing plants in the glasshouses erected on the site. The site has not been used as a horticultural site for the 20 years following the closing and ceasing of trade of the nursery in early 2003. It was instead used for storage by renting out the greenhouses, shed and land out for landscaping firms, car storage, gating along with a number of other companies over this time. The yard is currently being used by a scaffold business and the steel and brick buildings by third parties. The previous owner of the site at various stages rented out the site and buildings to a number different businesses/parties following ceasing of the garden

tollowing ceasing of the garden centre on site.

In April 2025, a certificate of existing lawful development was granted which confirmed that the site in question had been in continuous use for B2 and B8 purposes for in excess of 10 years.

But Warrington Borough Council planners rejected the application under delegated powers on the basis of the information submitted.

basis of the information submitted, the development would not described not meet the criteria, including conditions, for permitted development as set out in Schedule 2, Part 7, Class H of the Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) (England) Order 2015(as Furthermore, the application does not demonstrate that planning permission is not required for the demolition of the existing buildings. As such the proposed development would not be lawful.

Moving in together - things to think about

Taking the step to move in together is an exciting milestone for any couple. It often feels like the natural next step in a settled and stable relationship but behind the excitement there are some practical and legal considerations that should not be overlooked.

Perhaps one of the first conversations to be had before deciding to live together should be about expectations. Living together inevitably changes the relationship and the rhythm of daily life so it's important to talk about expectations - from household chores to the payment of bills, from respecting personal space to inviting friends and relatives. Open and frank communication early can prevent misunderstandings and minimise the potential for conflict later.

Finances are another essential topic. Discuss how you'll manage the rent or mortgage and other household bills and day-to-day living expenses. Money is one of the biggest sources of tension in relationships so talk openly about financial arrangements before moving in together so there's no misunderstandings or unhappy surprises afterwards.


