

Petition launched to get church clock chiming again

A petition has been launched to get the Parish church clock at Culcheth chiming again after it was stopped due to noise complaints.

Local Independent Cllr. Neil Johnson says he is working diligently with the Borough Council and the Parish Church to resolve an impasse over the chiming of the village clock.

A petition has now been launched in support of the campaign and signed by more than 750 people.



The clock's quarterly and nighttime chimes have stopped following a complaint that they represented a noise nuisance which led to the Council launching a noise investigation. decision has been met with dismay throughout the village, with many residents viewing the chimes as an important aspect of village life.

Now, Cll Johnson has provided

an update on the situation saying: "For some weeks now, I have been

in contact with the Borough Council and representatives from the Church, including the Bell Captain.

"Following a recent complaint, the Church have agreed that the clock will no longer sound during the night, as this can be disturbing to people while they are sleeping. However, the request to turn off the quarterly chimes has become a real "sticking point". It is understood that this didn't actually come from the original complainant, which makes it even more of a frustration.

"Therefore, to try and resolve this, the Church have requested a meeting with relevant officers from the Council and myself as the local Independent Councillor. If the original complainant is willing to meet as well, then they would also be welcome to come along. Getting all parties around the table most productive way of reaching

"The Church has organised a petition to show that there is support locally for the chimes to continue. I would encourage all residents to add their signatures and show your support for this important aspect of village life. The more signatures we gather the better.

The current situation does not affect the ringing of the church bells, which can continue to be rung for weddings, services and other events.

"I will keep all parties apprised of the situation as it develops, but please be assured that I am completely committed to working with everyone involved to get this situation resolved. One way or another, the village clock will chime



MP to challenge Peel Ports over unfair discount scheme for Toll Bridge

WARRINGTON North MP Charlotte Nichols says she is going to challenge Peel Ports over their unfair discount scheme for people living near Warburton Toll Bridge.

While some people living around four miles from the bridge qualify for a 50 per cent discount, others living only two miles away in areas

like Glazebrook don't qualify.

Ms Nichols said: "The tolls on
the Warburton Toll Bridge should
never have been increased by Peel Ports, and I have consistently campaigned against this.

Only a small number of post code areas were given a discount, and Glazebrook was not included. I agree that Glazebrook residents should also receive the 50% Warburton Toll Bridge discount awarded to residents of other

"Currently, only Risley, Rixton, Lymm and Partington receive a 50% discount, but some of these places are further away than Glazebrook is from the bridge. This is not fair. "I will be raising this matter with both Peel Ports and the Government

to see what can be done to extend the discount area.'

Ms Nichols was responding to a letter from Glazebrook resident Diane Dixon, who said: "Both myself and my husband regularly use the Warburton toll bridge on our commute to work. We are approximately 2 miles from the

concerned. bridge 3 days per week.

"Many people living over 4 miles from the bridge can claim a discount, but those living 2/3 miles away are excluded.

"Peel do not seem willing to communicate with anyone on this matter, so I was hoping our local MPs would meet with Peel to discuss whether they can find a solution to

this problem.
"I think everyone agrees that there should be a 50% discount

for local residents, but we need a scheme which is fair to all



One person taken to hospital and homes evacuated after car crashes into house

ONE person was taken to hospital and 12 homes were evacuated due to a gas leak risk after a car collided into a house at Glazebury, Warrington, on Sunday, Octobér

Two fire engines from Warrington and Lymm and the major rescue unit from Lymm attended the incident at Millbrook Close, Glazebury.

Emergency services were called after a car crashed into a detached house on Millbrook Close, which led to concerns about damage to a gas main.

The driver of the car was taken to hospital, and three passengers were also checked over by paramedics at the scene.

As a precaution, around 12 homes were evacuated due to the gas leak risk. Residents were relocated to another property while the incident was dealt with. Cadent

Gas isolated the supply, and the vehicle was recovered.

The incident was left with the police to manage the scene, with support from local authority teams

to check the building's safety.
A spokesperson for Cheshire
Police confirmed: "At 3.23pm on Sunday 26 October, police were called to reports of a collision in Millbrook Close, Warrington.

"The collision involved one vehicle which had collided with a house and damaged a gas main. There were no reports of any serious injuries.

"Nearby residents evacuated as a precaution while the incident was dealt with."

A cordon was put in place as precautionary measure while the local authority evaluated the structural damage.

Public greeted by security guards at Parish Council meeting as independents excluded

TWO security guards greeted people arriving at the latest meeting of Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council, while two independent Clirs. were excluded from part two of the meeting.

Now one of those excluded, Independent Clir Neil Johnson has slammed the parish council as being "undemocratic" and as being "undemocratic" and urged villagers to unite against democracy coalition involving local Labour and Conservative councillors.

A report emerged on Facebook from newly-elected Parish Councillor Bernie Kingston, who claimed Bernie Kingston, who claimed that an unadvertised meeting of some Parish Councillors was taking place at Culcheth Library, in a room where the blinds were drawn. Cllr Johnson was unaware of this meeting being convened, or its purpose. He has written to the Administrative Assistant who is currently supporting the Parish Council in the absence of a Clerk to ask for more details but, so far. to ask for more details but, so far, received no reply.

Tensions rose at the Parish Council meeting at Glazebury Methodist Church, when two members of the public sought to ask questions in the Public Forum section of the meeting, but were told they couldn't do so because the issues they wanted to raise were not on the Agenda.

"Ridiculous"

Members of the public who attended were greeted by the sight of two private security guards who had been hired to marshal the event. Cllr Johnson says he received no notification that the

received no notification that the Parish Council was planning to hire private security, or any details of the associated costs. He has branded the move "ridiculous". Then, in what Cllr. Johnson describes as a "shocking" and "unprecedented" move, the Parish Council meeting was adjourned for a "Part 2" (Confidential) meeting, which he and Cllr Kingston (both Independent members) were asked Independent members) were asked to leave! Cllr Johnson has not been told what the confidential meeting discussed, or given any information

relating to his exclusion.

Cllr Johnson said after the meeting: "I am shocked at the latest turn of events. The Parish Council in Culcheth and Glazebury is now a totally undemocratic body, which seems to be operating as a closed shop. Input from residents is unwelcome, and opportunities for local people to engage and ask questions are being actively shut

down.
"I am completely opposed to the new format of Parish Council meetings, where questions can only be taken in a 15-minute section about items already on the Agenda by prior arrangement with the Parish Clerk. This is designed to exclude residents from raising concerns and engaging with elected representatives. I am firmly in favour of reverting to the old format, where we conducted the business of the Parish Council and then opened the floor to members of the public, who could raise any issue they wished, ask questions, and didn't have to give notice in advance. That is proper

engagement and accountability. The way two residents were treated was frankly contemptable.

"Hiring private security to marshal a Parish Council meeting is utterly ridiculous. Who do these people think they are? Who paid for this and when was it agreed?

I have certainly never been asked.
"Finally, in a shocking and unprecedented move, the two Independent members of the Parish Council were excluded from a Part Council were excluded from a Part 2 (Confidential) meeting, without warning or explanation. This is not only undemocratic, it may well be illegal. This was a meeting of the full Parish Council, to which all ten members should have been invited to participate. To simply ask us to leave, without giving any hint of what was being discussed, is beyond belief.

Anti-democracy

"It is clear to me that Labour and the Conservatives have united to form an anti-democracy coalition. The two main parties are working together to try and prevent scrutiny, and are now actively conspiring behind closed doors against Independent members. Whether they agree with Cllr Kingston or I is irrelevant, we have a right to be present at Part 2 meetings and take part. I am astonished that the Administrative Assistant is party to any of this.

The residents of Culcheth and Glazebury must unite against this affront to democracy. The Parish Council in its current form is placing self-interest ahead of the community. It is a closed shop, filled with Labour and Conservative councillors who are on a power trip at the expense of the people. Enough is enough."

Cllr Johnson has called for the Borough Council solicitor and the Cheshire Association of Local Councils to instigate an investigation into the Part 2 meeting events, to determine upon what grounds he and Cllr Kingston were excluded, and upon whose

authority.
Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council, The local Labour group and Cllr. Bernie Kingston, all declined to comment on Cllr Johnson's statement at this stage.

Remembrance Day Civic Parade

This year's Remembrance Day Civic Parade at Culcheth will take place on Sunday November 9. Now the winter rains havearrived remember to ensure better drainage in your pots and containers.

Plant Area Specialist

- There are a surprising number of plants that perform well over the winter period, often they are well scented - examples include Sarcococca, Hamamelis and Mahonia.
- Areas of the border, that are currently empty, can be dug over and enriched with blended manure for next year's planting.
- Cut down any herbaceous plants that have finished flowering and that do not have a strong winter structure. Weed and fork gently between them.



Glazebrook WI is now planning a special celebration to mark its 80th birthday.


Memorial service

WI members hear about search and rescue work

MEMBERS of Croft WI welcomed Barbara Broderick, from Cheshire Search and Rescue, at their monthly

meeting – and heard about the work of the voluntary group.

Cheshire Search and Rescue first started in 2004 when a small group of hospital staff got together to help police search for a missing

Warrington schoolgirl.

The group now has 72 members who are on call 24 hours a day to assist the police, ambulance and fire services as well as other lowland and mountain rescue

Last year, the team responded to 42 call outs comprising 33 missing person searches, eight North West Ambulance assists and one snow rescue when a taxi got stuck near the Cat and Fiddle Inn! A call out could be to search for a vulnerable, young, old, lost, ill or injured person, particularly in areas not accessible by road such as forest, agricultural land or moorland.

The team use a control vehicle with access to the police mapping system and a larger van which can

carry kit and casualties if needed. A small boat team can be deployed and on New Year's Day this year they were called out to a flood rescue in Didsbury and helped bring 450 people and various pets to safety.

Unfortunately Cheshire Search and Rescue have no permanent indoor training space and their three vehicles are currently based in Widnes, Wilmslow and Winsford. The team cover the whole of Cheshire - an area of 2,343 square kilometres.

The volunteers train together once a week and must regularly take part in training courses provided by qualified professionals to remain active on the call out list. Members also commit to help with fundraising events as Cheshire Search and Rescue is entirely funded by donations.
