A New Year sees some new faces, with Sarah Smith, currently Executive Director of Health and Social Care at Knowsley Council, taking over as Chief Executive at cash-strapped Warrington Borough Council.

Sarah has extensive experience of adult services and oversaw a CQC "Good" rating of Knowsley's adult social care services in August 2025. With our town finances so stretched, with the council having to find another £90m of savings over the next four years, she faces a tough task.

This is at the same time as Labour councillors voting to increase their own allowances over the next three years, to bring themselves into line with other local authorities, while at the same time seeking to raise our council taxes above the 5 per cent cap.

Financial pressures also continue



at our local hospital which is in the process of merging with the Bridgewater NHS Trust, the organisation responsible for community health care needs.

Hopefully with the two organisations becoming one, it will not only save money but also see more joined up thinking – although until Warrington Borough Council gets a grip on social care, it is going to be a tough task.

Meanwhile, it was recently announced that Lymm resident and former MP Andy Carter, will take on a new role as Chair of Warrington & Halton Hospitals NHS Trust next April. The merger with Bridgewater will see it become North Cheshire



& Merseyside NHS Trust.

I look forward to reengaging with Mr Carter soon to discuss some of the issues facing our hospital.



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The 19 Steps – restored following local fundraising



A NEW set of 19 steps providing improved access to the footpaths on Pestfurlong Hill, Birchwood, Warrington has been completed following local fundraising.

The steps, leading from Silver Lane towards the paths, replace earlier steps which were in need of repair.

In the past, individual steps had been replaced frequently and it became clear a full renewal was needed.

The Friends of Gorse Covert Mounds provided funding of £650, raised by selling willow sculptures and running stalls at the annual Birchwood Carnival as well as at Risley Moss Green Safari Days and Birchwood WI Christmas Fairs.

A further £150 was donated by the Friends of Birchwood Forest Park Community Café and the project was managed by The Woodland Trust.

Nigel Balding, chair of the Friends of Gorse Covert Mounds said: "It's

wonderful to show visitors how their support has helped bring about such welcome improvements.

"By coincidence, there are 19 steps – echoing the title of an award-winning romantic novel. Perhaps this will become a fitting local name, complementing the much-loved willow tunnel near the top of the hill, a favourite spot for family photos and sometimes even surrounded by a fairy ring.

"I'd like to say a big thank you to our Woodland Trust site manager Neil Oxley for organising the new steps, and to all at the Birchwood Forest Park Community Café for their donation and continued support; this café is a wonderful resource for the community."

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From troubled teen to boxing – the inspiring turnaround story of Sarah Grant

When Warrington Youth Zone (WYZ) opened its doors in 2022, its mission was to offer young people in Warrington a safe, supportive space – “somewhere to go, something to do and someone to talk to.”

For 20-year-old amateur boxer Sarah Grant, that mission proved to be life-changing.

As a teenager, Sarah found herself on a difficult path. “I used to be in the wrong crowd,” she reflects. At around 15, she struggled with intense anxiety and poor mental health – But beneath the surface, she says she had “a big heart,” always trying to support other young people struggling with their own mental health.

One night changed everything. As Sarah puts it, a youth worker – later identified as Jack Taylor – saw “behind the smile” and recognised someone who desperately needed help.

That moment led to her being referred to the boxing programme at WYZ. “They always said I had a fire in my belly,” she recalls.

Boxing proved to be more than just a sport for Sarah – it became a lifeline. Under Jack’s mentorship she discovered discipline, purpose and self-worth.

That structured support and consistent presence helped shift her life away from danger and despair.

For the past five years, boxing has been central to Sarah’s identity. What started as a way to channel anxiety evolved into ambition.

Today, she trains regularly and

recently stepped into the ring for her first proper fight – a milestone she views as proof of how far she has come.

Although it ended in defeat it will not deter her ambition with her coach believing she has every chance of becoming a professional boxer in the future.

But the biggest transformation has been in her role within the Youth Zone. Once shy and overwhelmed, Sarah has blossomed into a confident young coach and mentor.

“I went from being this shy, withdrawn girl to being the one who’s putting back – being part of people’s lives,” she says. In doing so, she has become a living embodiment of WYZ’s mission.

Warrington Youth Zone offers a wide range of activities – from music, cooking and arts, to fully equipped gyms, climbing walls, dance and drama studios. Boxing and martial arts are among the core offerings aimed at building discipline, confidence, and resilience. The centre also runs targeted programmes – such as the 2023 “Train Like a Pro” programme – combining sport, personal development and mentoring for young people at risk of disengaging from school or community.

Support for WYZ remains strong and growing.

For Sarah, WYZ has been nothing short of a second chance. Once stuck in a cycle of anxiety and unhealthy influences, she now wakes up every day driven by purpose – training, mentoring others.

“I can’t describe how much it’s given me,” she says.

Her story stands as a testament to the power of community support, sport and consistent mentorship.

For Sarah, and for many others, Warrington Youth Zone isn’t just a facility – it’s a place that offers hope, healing and a future.



Hotel used to house asylum seekers undergoing “dramatic” multi-million pound refurbishment

THE Daresbury Park Hotel and Spa near Warrington, which closed to the public to house asylum seekers, is currently undergoing a “dramatic” multi-million pound refurbishment.

The Daresbury Park Hotel housed asylum seekers for over five years under a contract with the Home Office until the government ended its contract with the hotel last Spring, as part of a wider effort to reduce the use of hotels for asylum accommodation. Residents were moved to other parts of the asylum estate.

The 4-star Elite Venue Selection hotel will include a new health club, coffee lounge and landscaped gardens.

Construction work is seeing all 228 bedrooms and bathrooms fully remodelled and significantly upgraded with stylish new fixtures and furnishings. The hotel’s bar and restaurant and its seven-suite conference facilities are also being stripped and renovated alongside the reception area and all communal spaces.

In addition, a new coffee lounge is being created as part of the work and the venue will benefit from a brand new health club comprising an indoor heated pool, steam room and spa pool plus a gym, squash court and fitness suite.

Daresbury Park Hotel is set to open in March 2026 and will form part of the Elite Venue

Selection portfolio – a collection of 15 luxurious hotel experiences in premium locations. The portfolio has been meticulously curated following a series of acquisitions to provide distinctive destinations for weddings, corporate gatherings, spa breaks and golf retreats.

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Call to Save Woolston Neighbourhood Hub passed unanimously by council

A motion to Save Woolston Neighbourhood Hub was passed unanimously at the Full meeting of Warrington Borough Council.

A large number of protestors braved the rain to make their feelings known outside the Parr Hall before the meeting.

After much debate, the council unanimously agreed a Motion proposed by Councillor Tynan and seconded by Cllr. Stuart Mann.

Thanking campaigners who turned out in force, Local Cllr. Rob Tynan said: "Last night's Full Council sent a clear message: Woolston Hub must be saved. My motion to save our hub was passed unanimously, now it's time for this Labour-run Council to get on with setting out steps to reopening and making sure the consultation is open and transparent."

"Residents have waited long enough. The Hub is vital to our community, our health, and our local services. That's why I will keep holding the Council to account until we see a real plan, proper engagement, and firm action to reopen the facility using any means necessary."

"I'll continue to fight for Woolston and make sure local voices are heard loud and clear. And while this motion is a big step forward, the fight isn't over. I urge everyone to keep signing the petition as it strengthens our case and shows just how much local people care about

this vital community asset."

Cllr Mann added: "To have this motion passed is a really, really positive first step BUT as Rob said last night this is not the end, it is only the start."

"Much more needs to be done to secure the future of the 'Hub We Love' and moreover ALL leisure services across Warrington."

"Whilst the conversation of how we got to this point is a very valid one I think at least for today we should celebrate what was achieved last night."

"Now the hard work begins!"

The motion: Woolston Neighbourhood Hub has long been a central part of local life, providing access to a swimming pool, library, gym, squash courts and community spaces. Situated alongside the local GP practice, it plays an important role in supporting health, wellbeing, learning and social connection. Since its closure in September 2025 due to water-safety and structural concerns, residents have been left without access to many valued services. The ongoing uncertainty has understandably caused frustration and concern about the future of the site. It is widely recognised that the challenges facing community facilities are complex and that

difficult decisions may be required. However, any decisions about Woolston's future must be shaped openly and with meaningful involvement from local people. Woolston is a growing community with evolving needs, and long-term planning should reflect that. This Council resolves to:

1. Acknowledge the full community value of the Woolston Hub, including its contribution to health, leisure, learning and social wellbeing.
2. Commit to a clear and transparent consultation on the future of the site, ensuring that Woolston residents can participate fully.

3. Explore and publish all realistic options for repairing, reusing or replacing the facility, supported by clear and accessible costings.

4. Ensure continued access to local library services, fitness facilities and community meeting space, either within the existing site or nearby.

5. Work collaboratively with local GP services to understand how any future proposals may affect patient access and primary care provision.

6. Provide a detailed update to Full Council within three months, setting out progress, findings and proposed next steps.

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Divorce Column

Divorce – Matters of Power, Control and Abuse

Family solicitors are increasingly dealing with separations in circumstances involving patterns of controlling, manipulative or emotionally abusive behaviour. These cases cut across all backgrounds and are far more common than many people realise.

Unlike physical abuse, emotional abuse and coercive control often leave no visible marks. They may involve persistent belittling, gaslighting, isolation from friends or family, financial restriction, monitoring of movements or the gradual erosion of a person's confidence and self-belief. Victims may begin to doubt their own perceptions, minimise what is happening, or feel incapable of making decisions without fear of repercussions.

The law now recognises coercive and controlling behaviour as a serious and harmful form of abuse. It is not about occasional arguments; it is characterised not by conflict but by dominance. Further, such abuse does not always end when the relationship does. In some relationships the control continues and might even escalate after separation – played out through children, finances, relentless communication or the manipulation of the legal processes – perhaps by causing delay or refusal to engage constructively.

There has also been a marked increase in cases involving extreme levels of self-focus, lack of accountability, narrative shifting and refusal to compromise – behaviours often associated with narcissistic traits. While 'narcissism' is not a legal expression the associated conduct frequently presents very real challenges in resolving financial or child-related arrangements. These behaviours can make achieving negotiated outcomes extremely difficult and turn otherwise straightforward divorces into prolonged disputes.

Not every difficult breakup is abusive, of course. However, where fear, imbalance of power or psychological harm are present, approaches that assume equality between the parties are likely to be inappropriate and ineffective. In these circumstances a firmer and more robust approach is likely to be required to address and manage the imbalance of power and dominance at play.

Early legal advice can be critical in these cases. Identifying controlling behaviour at an early stage helps ensure that the right approach is adopted from the outset.

Plan for new all-through school approved despite opposition

PLANS to create a new "all-through" school catering for pupils aged 2-16 at Padgate have been approved by Warrington planners, despite opposition from local residents.

The decision by Warrington Borough Council Development Management Committee to approve plans for all-through school at the Bruche Primary Academy site in Seymour Drive, Padgate, has been welcomed by Warrington Primary Academy Trust (WPAT).

A protest petition signed by 79 residents and 14 individual letters of objection had been received and the local parish council had also objected. But planning officers recommended the scheme be approved.

The school – designed to help cope with a growing shortfall of secondary school places in the borough – involves an expansion of the existing Bruche Primary School.

It will mean the demolition of the existing southern block of buildings, which are no longer used, the erection of a new early years wing and an extension of the existing primary school.

Welcoming the decision, Bernard Clarke, Chief Operations Officer at Warrington Primary Academy Trust (WPAT) said: "We of course welcome the planning committee's decision to approve our plans for a new all-through school on the site of Bruche Primary Academy in Seymour Drive, Padgate.

"We are now looking forward to

making a start on clearance work on the site in early 2026 before construction starts.

"Our aim is to welcome our first pupils into the school in September 2026. This is an exciting additional offer to families in Warrington, with Bruche Primary Academy developing into Bruche Academy School, the first all-through school in the borough.

"Bruche Academy will provide the community with a much-needed boost to secondary school places over the next few years – meeting a demand identified by council plans.

"We understand that this development has caused some concern to nearby residents but through a process of public consultations we have listened and made alterations to our original plans so that we can ensure the new all-through school will be a good neighbour.

"We have taken care in our proposals to minimise impacts from the new building, siting it as far away from existing properties as possible and beyond the recommended distance.

"The plans include planting trees and shrubbery along our border to increase the privacy of residents and minimising windows

overlooking gardens.

"Car parking has also been significantly expanded, with increased pedestrian space, allowing cars on site so that we can reduce impact on street parking. The site will retain multiple entrances and staggered school start times.

"The new building will accommodate a maximum of just 60 Year 7 students on its scheduled

opening in September 2026 and will only reach its full complement of 300 students five years later. The site's new sports and cultural facilities will also be available for use by the community.

"Bruche Primary Academy has an exemplary reputation for academic performance and behaviour and these high standards will continue to apply to the new all-through school."



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Obesity: A chronic disease we must start treating seriously

January is the point in the year when many people take stock of their health after a season of over-eating, and obesity inevitably comes into sharper focus. Too often the discussion is wrapped in blame, willpower and personal failure. This view is outdated. Obesity is a chronic, biologically driven disease with well-understood mechanisms, and it carries serious long-term risks to health if left unmanaged.

We now know that bodyweight regulation is governed by complex systems involving gut hormones, brain signalling, metabolism and genetics. These systems are designed to defend body fat, not shed it. This is why so many people experience weight-cycling or "yo-yoing" despite working extremely hard. They lose weight, then regain it because the underlying biology pushes back. This is not a lack of discipline; it is the natural behaviour of a chronic disease. Stigma is not only unfair but clinically harmful, as it discourages people from seeking proper help.

Obesity significantly increases the risk of cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes, fatty liver disease, sleep apnoea and several cancers. It is not about appearance or vanity; it is about reducing the diseases that shorten life expectancy and diminish quality of life.

Effective management requires a structured approach built on four pillars: nutrition, physical activity, behavioural support and,

when appropriate, medication. Sustainable dietary change matters far more than short-lived restrictive diets. Physical activity should be realistic, safe and progressive. Behavioural support helps consolidate habits over the long term rather than relying on bursts of motivation that inevitably fade.

Medication can be transformative for many people when used correctly, and the evidence for modern anti-obesity medicines is strong. After eight years of prescribing these treatments, we have observed consistent, safe and meaningful weight reduction when they are used under proper supervision. However, these medicines are powerful and must be treated with the same caution as any other prescription therapy.

A growing problem is the widespread availability of counterfeit or illegally sourced weight-loss drugs. These products often contain incorrect ingredients, unsafe doses, or no active medication at all, and they pose

serious risks. No-one should ever obtain obesity medication online or through unregulated vendors. Treatment must be supervised by a qualified GP who understands the patient's medical history, monitors progress and manages dosing safely.

At My GP Clinic, we take a non-judgemental, medically grounded

approach to obesity care. We aim to inform, support and guide people towards long-term health rather than temporary fixes. January is a sensible moment to take action, but tackling obesity is a year-round commitment. With expert oversight and a structured plan, meaningful and lasting change is entirely achievable.



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Major investment to expand local SEND provision



A major investment to expand SEND provision in Warrington, including a £675,000 investment at Birchwood High School, has been approved by Warrington Borough Council's cabinet.

The significant package of capital investment aims to expand and improve school facilities across the borough, supporting children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). The investment also aims to tackle children being sent out of the borough for SEND placements at high costs.

At its meeting on Monday, 8 December, the cabinet agreed to increase investment to £675,000 for a new designated provision at Birchwood High School. This facility will create 24 specialist places for students with Social, Emotional, and Mental Health (SEMH) needs – the first secondary provision of its kind in Warrington.

This investment forms part of the council's wider strategy to meet rising demand for Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs). By enhancing local provision, the council aims to ensure children can access high-quality education within their own community, reducing the need for long journeys to out-of-area placements.

Cllr Matt Smith, Cabinet Member for Children's, Families and Education, said: "This is a vital investment in our children's futures. We are seeing a significant rise in demand for specialist support, and it is our absolute priority to ensure that Warrington children can access high-quality education in settings that meet their specific needs."

"I am particularly pleased that we are moving forward with the

new provision at Birchwood High School. Creating 24 new places for students with social, emotional, and mental health needs within a mainstream secondary setting will be transformative for those young people, allowing them to learn alongside their peers and stay connected to their local community."

The cabinet report highlighted ten active schemes designed to increase capacity and improve accessibility in schools. In addition to Birchwood High, investments include:

- Green Lane Special School – Reconfiguring the main building to create additional classrooms, break-out spaces, and installing a new lift to increase capacity.
- Gorse Covert Primary School – Creating a new designated provision classroom with a sensory space and outdoor learning area.
- Meadowside Primary School – Refurbishing classrooms to include regulation spaces.
- Padgate High School – Improving accessibility with new toilet and shower facilities and creating an additional classroom.
- Statham and Saint Vincent's Primary Schools – Adaptations to create new designated provision classes.

The new provision at Birchwood High School is expected to open in 2026, with construction works scheduled to commence in the spring term.



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Spotlight on Local History with James Balme

A wander around Lymm Dam and historic St. Mary's Church



The village of Lymm stands at the eastern end of the borough of Warrington and is renowned for its beautiful picturesque village centre with shops, restaurants and the quaint lower dam that runs through it.

But if you take a walk along the 'Dingle' that runs alongside the lower dam you will eventually come to Lymm Dam and the ancient church of St. Mary's standing high on a sandstone outcrop. First built in the 11th century the church has been a place of worship for around a thousand years and today we see the current church having been rebuilt between 1850 to 1852 based on a design by John Dobson of Newcastle, however during the construction of the new church gun powder was used to destroy the original 15th century nave and aisle, something that today would be considered a criminal act. The site that the church stands upon today is considered to be one of the oldest religious sites in the north of Cheshire.

Directly below the church can be found Lymm Dam much used in Victorian times and today as an area of natural beauty and a very popular area for walking and relaxing. Originally it was Bradley Brook and it ran through the sandstone gorge close to the church. But in 1824 Lymm Dam was created as part of the construction of a new turnpike road. This allowed for the sandstone gorge to be flooded creating the lake we see today and being filled from the brook and natural springs. The area around the dam was part of the Lymm Hall estate. Water from the main dam ran down into the lower dam in the village centre with this being the mill pond that fed the nearby cornmill. Below the cornmill the flowing stream gained the name of Slitten Brook reflecting the nearby slitting mill in the village. There is no doubt that the construction of the dam in 1824 was a pivotal moment in the industrial landscape of Lymm providing much needed extra waterpower for the mills in the area. This in turn led to the creation of wealth for the mill owners who had built these structures. In 1848 a wealthy Manchester cotton merchant named George Dewhurst built a large mansion on land in

Lymm high above the Dam. The industrial past of Lymm can still be clearly seen in the landscape today including the remains of the slitting mill that was used for slitting and rolling iron bars providing many local jobs in the area. By 1800 this had been transformed into a textile mill before closing for the last time in 1825.

A visit to Lymm Dam to enjoy the beautiful landscape and explore the ancient church of St. Mary is a must and why not take a walk down the Dingle following the course of the stream as it winds slowly through the trees towards the lower dam in the village centre.

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Autumn Budget 2025: Tax Rises, Threshold Freezes and a Shift in Incentives

After months of speculation, the Chancellor has unveiled the government's Autumn 2025 Budget, setting out a package of tax and spending measures aimed at supporting economic growth while addressing ongoing cost-of-living pressures.

In her statement, the Chancellor described the measures as "fair and necessary choices to deliver on our promise of change." In practice, the Budget relies heavily on continued fiscal drag, targeted tax rises, and a rebalancing of incentives for investment and business growth. Below is a summary of the key announcements affecting individuals and businesses.

Income tax and national insurance

The freeze on income tax thresholds has been extended yet again. The personal allowance (£12,570), higher-rate threshold (£50,270) and additional-rate threshold (£125,140), together with equivalent National Insurance Contribution (NIC) thresholds, will now remain frozen until 5 April 2031. Scottish income tax rates and bands will continue to differ.

The NICs secondary threshold of £5,000 will also be frozen until 2031. In addition, salary-sacrificed pension contributions above £2,000 per annum will become subject to employer and employee NICs from 6 April 2029, reducing the attractiveness of higher pension sacrifice arrangements.

Tax relief for non-reimbursed homeworking expenses will be removed from 6 April 2026, ending a long-standing claim for many

employees.

Dividend taxation will increase from 6 April 2026, with rates rising from 8.75% to 10.75% for basic-rate taxpayers and from 33.75% to 35.75% for higher-rate taxpayers. From 6 April 2027, savings income UK-wide and property income in England, Wales and Northern Ireland will also see a two-percentage-point rise, taking rates to 22%, 42% and 47%.

Voluntary Class 2 NICs will be abolished for individuals living abroad, while the dividend tax credit for non-UK residents will be removed from April 2026. Image rights payments linked to employment will be treated as taxable employment income from 6 April 2027, subject to income tax and both employer and employee NICs.

Further changes include the removal of post-departure trade profits provisions in temporary non-residence rules from April 2026, and a reduction in income tax relief on Venture Capital Trust (VCT) investments to 20% from the same date.

Capital gains tax

Several changes will affect business owners and succession planning. CGT relief on qualifying disposals to employee ownership trusts (EOTs) will reduce from 100% to 50% for disposals on or after 26 November 2025.

Incorporation relief will no longer be automatic and must be actively claimed from 6 April 2026. Anti-avoidance rules covering share exchanges and company reconstructions will also be tightened

from 26 November 2025.

Inheritance tax

The inheritance tax nil-rate band (£325,000), residence nil-rate band (£175,000), and the new combined £1 million allowance for agricultural property relief (APR) and business property relief (BPR) will now remain frozen until 5 April 2031.

The combined £1 million APR and BPR allowance will be transferable between spouses and civil partners. In addition, inheritance tax charges on relevant property trusts settled by former non-domiciled individuals will be capped at £5 million from 6 April 2025.

Other personal tax measures

A new High Value Council Tax Surcharge will apply to English residential properties valued at £2 million or more from 1 April 2028, ranging from £2,500 to £7,500 per year and uprated annually by CPI.

The cash ISA allowance for those under 65 will reduce from £20,000 to £12,000 from April 2027, although the overall ISA allowance will remain unchanged. New London Stock Exchange listings will be exempt from Stamp Duty Reserve Tax for three years, and a new settlement opportunity will be introduced for individuals with outstanding loan charge liabilities.

The scope of higher-rate Air Passenger Duty will extend to all private jets over 5.7 tonnes from 1 April 2027.

Business taxes

For businesses, the Chancellor announced a new 40% first-year capital allowance from 1 January 2026, alongside a reduction in the main writing-down allowance from 18% to 14%.

The 100% first-year allowances for zero-emission cars and EV charge-points will be extended to 2027, while historic Shadow ACT restrictions will be relaxed from April 2026.

Transfer pricing, permanent establishment and Diverted Profits Tax rules will be simplified from January 2026, with new international transaction reporting requirements introduced from 2027.

Other measures include VAT changes affecting private hire vehicles and disabled vehicle schemes, a new VAT relief for business donations to charity, expansion of the EMI scheme, and increased fundraising limits under EIS and VCT.

Overall, the Autumn 2025 Budget continues the trend of raising revenue through threshold freezes and targeted tax increases, while selectively encouraging investment and business growth. For individuals and business owners alike, forward planning will be critical in navigating the changes ahead.
