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
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


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Culcheth High School celebrates good OFSTED

CULCHETH High School's new head teacher David Terry is "delighted" with the schools "Good" OFSTED inspection.

The school hosted a visit from a team of five OFSTED Inspectors earlier this month and the inspection, which was carried out over two days, involved a rigorous scrutiny of the school's quality of provision.

Mr Terry said: "I am delighted to report that Culcheth High School has been judged to be a good school in all areas."

It has been rated as good in Overall Effectiveness, Achievement, Quality of Teaching, Behaviour and Safety of Students and Leadership and Management.

He said it was worth noting that OFSTED have significantly raised their expectations and requirements on all schools nationally to demonstrate higher standards than in previous years' inspections.

"I have no doubt that the commitment, dedication and sheer hard work of staff, students, parents, governors and wider community partners have culminated in a very positive report, an endorsement of the school over time that I think we can all be very proud of."

"The OFSTED team have given very clear areas for Culcheth High School to improve upon to achieve an outstanding judgement in time.

"It is my very strong belief that the Culcheth community deserve to have an outstanding school at the heart of our locality. At Culcheth High School we do not intend to rest on our laurels but rather to engage and work towards a vision of outstanding school status."

Highlights of the report stated that 'Culcheth High is a good school – it provides a good education for students.'

'Students develop good knowledge, skills and understanding well in most subjects, including English and mathematics.'

'Students consistently achieve results that are well above those of students nationally. In 2013, the proportion of students gaining at least five GCSE passes at grade C or above, including in English and mathematics, and their attainment in English and in mathematics, increased even further.'

'The proportion of students attaining A* to C passes at GCSE in a wide range of subjects is significantly higher than found nationally.'

'Students make good progress from their starting points and attain high standards in GCSE examinations.'

'Achievement is good as a result of effective teaching over time.'

'Students with special educational needs achieve well as a result of the well-planned provision and effective support they receive.'

'Students work hard and behave well. They are respectful to teachers and other adults.' 'Students support the learning of all by working together well. They are friendly and pleasant in their social time.'

'Students are open and courteous towards visitors. They are pleased to talk about their school. They look after the buildings and site well.'

'The curriculum meets students'

needs. It is enhanced by an extensive programme of activities, after school and visits during and out of school time.'

'The development of spiritual, moral, social and cultural aspects of students' learning is effective. The school has an active link with a partner school in Soweto. This involves teachers and students in exchange visits. Large amounts of money are raised for charity.'

This work is often led by sixth form students.'

'Spiritual, moral, social and cultural aspects of students' learning are well developed. Many students are actively involved in working for charities.'

'Governance is effective. Governors know the school well and challenge and support senior leaders.'

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Putting a Business Plan Together

A well thought out business plan is an important strategic document. It is also an integral tool for any business wishing to obtain government funding, investment capital or bank loans.

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- Those involved in its preparation (the business owners) will be encouraged to stand back and objectively look at where their business is, where it is going and how they may wish to redirect it
- The business plan will document the owners' considered plans at a particular time and can be used to focus minds when driving the business forward
- Future performance can be measured against the plan, variances investigated and the development of the business put back on track

The level of detail included in a business plan can vary depending on the nature and complexity of the

business. However, all plans should include a set of financial projections including profit and loss accounts, balance sheets and cash flows. This information will enable the owners of the business to determine where they are going and anticipate whether there will be an associated funding requirement involved in achieving their goals.

Perhaps the owners anticipate growing the business by a certain percentage or entering new locations or industry sectors. The business plan and projections should cover the period over which this growth is expected to take place and will typically cover between 3 and 5 years.

Good business management will involve the business plan being regularly revised and updated, at least once a year. Making this review part of the year end procedure will help focus the owners on the future and where their business is heading. In addition to a long term business

plan, a rolling 13 week (3 month) cash flow should be regarded as an essential business tool, irrespective of the economic climate.

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Parking restrictions lifted for six month trial

CONTROVERSIAL parking restrictions which resulted in motorists being fined while visiting Culcheth, have been lifted, following a lengthy campaign by local councillors.

Local councillor Paul Campbell has welcomed the news that the land owner of the car parks on Lodge Drive Culcheth, has agreed to the lifting of parking restrictions and the issuing of parking fines to motorists.

Together with other local councillors, Paul has been campaigning for some time to have

this practice stopped, firstly when vehicles were being clamped and then after the current Government banned that practice on private land, the issuing of parking tickets/Invoices.

Paul said: "This is great news for the many motorists who visit Culcheth daily and park on Lodge Drive to visit local shops,

restaurants, the playground and the local Methodist Church.

"I have been campaigning against this practice for some time and I have met with and written to the Landlord and I am pleased to say they have listened to the concerns of local residents and shop owners. The lifting of these parking fines has now been brought into effect for a six month period in which the Landlord proposes to monitor usage and if they feel the Car Park is being abused then they

will have to reintroduce restrictions.

"I would hope that this will not be the case and I would like to thank the Landlord for the community spirit they have shown in making this decision, one which I fully support. In the meantime I will be writing to the Landlord to thank them for this most welcome announcement and asking that they either remove or cover up the current parking signage to help avoid any confusion."

School's summer ball raised £1,800

A FUND-RAISING summer ball organised by members of the Parent-Teacher Association at Culcheth High School raised for than £1,800.

The well-attended event at Leigh Golf Club presented new head teacher Dave Terry with an opportunity to get to know many parents and friends of the school in an informal setting.

PTA chairman Ruth Morrison said: "It was a successful and enjoyable evening, well supported by many businesses in the village who we would like to sincerely thank for their help.

Reproductive Health group back fertility charity

Locally based Reproductive Health Group are helping raise funds for the national fertility charity – Infertility Network UK.

Based at their new state of the art clinic at Daresbury Park, the Centre for Reproductive Health, Reproductive Health Group provide high quality, patient centred care in fertility, gynaecology and IVF.

Amongst the latest technologies available at the Centre is EEVA (early embryo viability assessment).

Developed at Stanford University, this is a technique used in IVF treatment to help determine which fertilised embryos have the greatest potential for a successful outcome to the treatment.

Whilst there are many factors which affect the chances of

pregnancy through an IVF cycle, selecting the best embryos is an important one and EEVA provides additional information which makes it more likely that the embryo with the highest pregnancy potential is chosen.

From May 6th – June 15th, clinics in the UK which currently offer EEVA have been invited to help raise funds for the national fertility charity, Infertility Network UK, and Reproductive Health Group are proud to be a part of this campaign.
